DOG TEAM SENT TO VICTIMS OF CRASH

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Further efforts will be made today to send a dog team to the rescue of a mother and her 17-day-old baby stranded at a remote wilderness lake in western Alaska with two men when their plane was forced down Monday.

Pilot Kenneth Neese, who is directing rescue operations, reported here by radio last night a dog team, which earlier yesterday was said to have reached the party, was unable to get to the scene.

Neese dropped milk, blankets, cooking utensils and other articles to the party after he was informed of the dog team's failure to reach them and being told they were in need of immediate supplies.

Neese said he was led to the stranded yesterday morning by the scene pilot, Jimmy Dodson, who gave radio instructions. Snow had hidden Dodson's plane from view from the air.

Dodson reported his plane, carrying Mrs. Christian Beckman and her baby, of Ophir, and Ole Brenden, was forced down in a snow storm on the small lake.

ELECTIONS SLATED IN MANY CITIES

Pensions, Prohibition Also at Issue in Next Week's Battles at Polls.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Municipal contests promised to day to put an exciting punch next week in scattered off-year elections, highlighted by pension battles in California and Ohio.

The most unorthodox mayoral race is in Memphis, where Edward H. Crump, head of the city-county democratic organization, is unopposed as a "proxy" candidate.

Crump has said he would resign after taking the oath of office January 1, and permit the Crump-controlled city commission to appoint Rep. Walter Chandler as mayor. Chandler, meanwhile, is remaining here to support the administration's neutrality bill.

The Memphis election will be Nov. 4, but all others will be Nov. 7.

At Salt Lake City, Ab Jenkins, speed car driver of Salt Lake fame, is one of five candidates in a non-partisan race for mayor. He has campaigned on a safety program.

At Woburn, Mass., Mayor William E. Kane, a former marine who won publicity by turning off street lights on moonlit nights and advocating a lion's cage for drunks, lost the democratic nomination, but will be on the ballot as a republican.

Connecticut was watching the effort of Bridgeport's socialist mayor, Jasper McLevy, to win a fourth successive term. There is a scrubbed field at Waterbury, Conn., where Mayor Frank Hayes, a democrat, resigned after he and 22 others were convicted of conspiring to defraud the city of more than \$1,000,000.

The prohibition issue cropped up in Indiana, where dry forces were trying to elect town boards which would oppose issuance of liquor licenses in the communities below 3,000 population.

Two of the largest cities to choose mayors next week are Philadelphia and San Francisco.

The race in the former is between former Judge Robert E. Lamberton, republican, and Robert C. White, democrat. The republican hope for victory as a stepping stone toward winning Pennsylvania in the 1940 presidential race.

STICK-UP ADDS TO AUTO THEFT ORGY

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 1.—(AP)—Two men who held up Alfred Lamert of Pleasant Valley last night and stole his pickup truck are believed by state police officers in Baker to have been involved in a series of automobile thefts in eastern Oregon.

Lamert was forced to ride with the two men for a time, but immediately after his release notified officers. Too much time had elapsed, however, and the thieves are believed to have gone into Idaho.

The men are believed to possibly be connected with a series of car thefts in Baker county and Umatilla county within the last few days. A car was stolen in Pendleton last night and is believed to be in Baker county.

The cases are closely allied with the capture in The Dalles last night of a Wisconsin man, who, state police officers said, had in his possession an automobile belonging to C. E. Jones of Richland.

The man's two companions escaped from officers in The Dalles last night and are believed to have stolen the automobile of Otto Karr, Baker tire chief, recovered in Pleasant Valley.

Several other automobiles have also been stolen in Baker county during the last few days.

DIAMOND LAKE CCC CAMP WILL CLOSE

The Diamond lake CCC camp will be closed the last of this week and the small crew now engaged in the task of preparing the camp for the winter closure will return to its base at South Umpqua falls, V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest, reported today.

A side camp has been maintained at the lake during the summer season, with the crew having a maximum of 50 men. The forest guard station was reconstructed on a new location, adjoining the main road, and improvements were made to other forest buildings. A great deal of work also was done at the public camps on the east shore. Camps are now supplied with running water, fireplaces, stoves, tables, benches, etc., and all roads have been oiled.
