IMPORTANT! Carefully observe
timing for each method. Measure
level tablespoons of coffee to each
cup of water. Vary water slightly
for exact strength desired. Keep

DRIP METHOD: 6 to 8 minutes
preheated. If less than 2 cups
is made, water will drip too fast
giving weak brew.

GLASS VACUUM MAKERS: Put
upper bowl on after water boils.
Coffee and water should be in con-
tact 5 to 7 minutes.

PERCOLATOR: Start with cold or
hot water. "Perco" 7 to 10 minutes
after steady pumping starts.

COFFEE POT: Bring coffee and water
to boiling. Stir well. Add small
amount of cold water and let stand
5 minutes to settle grounds.

STEeping: Pour boiling water on
coffee. Sit well. Stir again in 5
minutes. Steep for a total of 10 to
15 minutes.
