LARCENY CHARGES FAGED BY THREE

Thomas E. Morel, charged jointly with Milton W. Stanton with grand larceny, was brought to Roseburg Sunday from Portland, by Deputy Sheriff Clifford Thornton, who reports that Stanton is under arrest at Vancouver, Wash., and will be brought here at a later date.

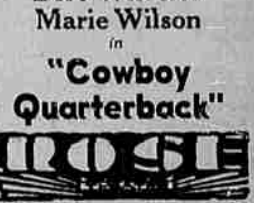
SPREE BRINGS FINE
