'ROARING TWENTIES' TEEMS WITH ACTION

The blood-and-thunder days of the early twenties—the crystal set, his-tack era—when speakases, bootlegging, tommy-guns and gangsters were words synonymous when "going for a ride" meant anything but a Sunday jaunt with the family, is the stirring saga of "The Roaring Twenties," the current attraction at the Indian theatre, ending tomorrow.

Dynamic James Cagney, in another top, two-rated performance, shares the starring role with lovely Priscilla Lane, the more-famous of the Lane sisters. She sings and handles the heart interest. Excellent support is given by Gladys George, who turns in a fine characterization as "Panama," the sal who runs a "speakeasy," and by Humphrey Bogart, the perennial villain of the colloid. What little comedy relief occurs is provided by funny Frank McHugh.

The story of this somewhat so-called, unenviable period in American history is full of action with plenty of run-time. It is fast-moving, setting an unhealthy pace from the final stages of the first world war until and shortly after the Wall street crash in '29. For those who like to reminisce, "The Roaring Twenties" will recall a lot of almost forgotten incidents when so much happened in a fast-changing world.

Filling out an evening of capital entertainment are a comedy and newswheel. Of interest to many will be the first pictures shown on the local screen of the UCLA-Oregon football game played recently in Los Angeles. Exciting shorts include all the scoring plays in the game the Bruins won 16 to 6. This alone is worth spending an evening at the cinema, especially so if you are a gridiron follower.
