MISSIONARY SOCIETY HAS DELIGHTFUL MEETING ON THURSDAY

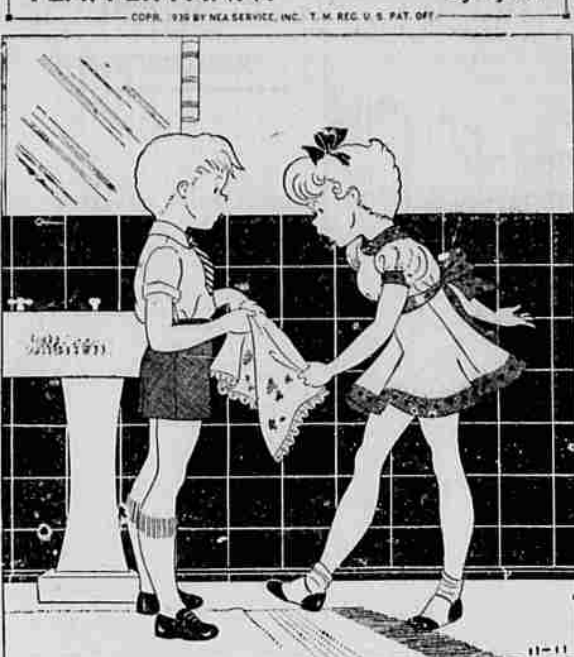

WORLD FAMOUS MUSICIAN AND WIFE SPEND WEEK HERE

A number of Roseburg residents have had the pleasure this week of meeting Marie Saint-Cyr, world famous conductor, composer, instrumentalist, poet, novelist, playwright and critic, who with her life, have spent the last week in Roseburg at the Hotel Umpqua.

Mr. and Mrs. Saint-Cyr were in an automobile accident a week ago just north of Roseburg, and remained in this city until their car was repaired. During their stay at the Umpqua hotel, a number of Roseburg musicians and residents called at the hotel to meet them.

Mr. Saint-Cyr has traveled in every country in the world and on Wednesday of this week was the guest speaker at the senior high school, where he talked before the assembly meeting, telling the students of his travels throughout the world. Mr. Saint-Cyr's talk was reported to be one of the most interesting and enjoyable heard at the school and was greatly appreciated.

As a composer, Saint-Cyr has received acclaim from countries in all parts of the world. He is a "Cellist of note and has written numerous books of music, books on travel and has composed a number of ballets including an opera, "Under the Myrtle Tree" and many pieces for piano, orchestra and voice. He was cellist in the Chilar Trio of Budapest and the Rother quartet of Prague, besides a number of classical ensembles. He is director of the school of music at Novosibirsk, the famous Black Sea resort, and he trained and conducted one of the outstanding symphony orchestras of eastern Europe. From 1929 to 1931 he was a guest conductor of the symphony orchestras of Munich, Madrid, Lausanne, Moscow, London, Paris, Warsaw, Vienna, Nuremberg and Constantinople, after which he returned to his school in Rome and to the "Academia Philharmonica." In addition to his musical and literary work, he has devoted much time to the stage, taking parts in Shakespeare and Moliere translations into Italian.

Mr. and Mrs. Saint-Cyr left this morning for Los Angeles, where the former will devote a part of his time to completing musical compositions and planning to continuing his career as a musician and conductor.
