

NUT LAW CHANGES CITED TO GROWERS

Important changes made in the nut law by the last session of the legislature are called to the attention of walnut growers. All unshelled walnuts and unshelled filberts sold, displayed, or offered for sale or shipment in the state must have the containers, bins, display tables, or other bulk displays labeled with a legislative label containing the following information:

1. The name of the state in which the nuts were grown.
2. Grade or reclassified brand and size of nut in the container.
3. Name and address of the grower, dealer or packer.

The above requirements should be carefully followed by both growers and retailers, in order that all requirements of the nut law are met. The only exception is that containers of five pounds or less capacity and bins and bulk displays shall be required only with the name of the state where grown and the grade and size of such nuts.

Inspection Compulsory. All unshelled walnuts and unshelled filberts handled in lots of 250 pounds or more must be inspected by the state department of agriculture, except that no inspection is required when in transit to a processing plant. Only one inspection is required of any one lot of nuts, and lots inspected are sealed with a hogging type seal with the letters "O. S. D. A." stamped thereon. When these seals are present, buyers or sellers are assured that the nuts have been inspected.

The grade regulations for Oregon walnuts are: "Oregon No. 1," "Oregon No. 2," "Oregon No. 3," and "Oregon Ungraded." Oregon ungraded walnuts can only be sold in the state of Oregon, and a definition of "Oregon Ungraded" walnuts is as follows: "Oregon ungraded shall include walnuts meeting the federal standard as administered by the United States pure food and drug act. Walnuts in this classification may be rejected as for size except that not more than 12 percent by count shall be smaller than 60-64 inch in diameter."

The above regulations regarding changes in the Oregon Walnut law has just been received at the county agent's office. Walnut growers or retailers desiring more complete information on the nut law may secure a copy of the law by calling at the county agent's office, according to J. Roland Parker, county agent.
