TIMBER CONTRACT IN EAST SETS RECORD

BOSTON, Nov. 14.—(AP)—A \$14,400,000 contract for the purchase of 600,000,000 board feet of New England hurricane-felled timber, believed to be the largest transaction of its kind in the nation's history, was made operative today by the Northwestern Timber Salvage administration.

Leslie S. Bean, director of the salvage administration, said the purchase was made by a newly formed cooperative of wholesalers in a contract signed last Friday in Washington. Timber owners would receive \$24 per thousand feet. Bean added, "considerably higher" than the price they normally receive.

The contract is effective for four and a half years and provides for payments of \$800,000 each quarter, allowing dealers a 20 per cent return on their investment. Profits in excess of that amount must be split between the cooperative, known as the Northeastern Timber and Marketing association, and the timber salvage administration. The latter's share must be distributed among the original timber owners.

The cooperative agreed to take possession of the saved lumber at the salvage scene, Bean said, adding that the contract would dispose of all the lumber—downed in

the 1938 hurricane—which the salvage administration contemplated handling, exclusive of that portion to be held in New England in anticipation of regional needs for the next six or seven years.

About 250,000,000 board feet of timber already has been sawed, and operations are continuing at the rate of 4,000,000 board feet a week.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS STATED

Illustrating some types of benefits under the amended social security act to be paid to eligible persons after next January 1, Carl D. Monroe, manager of the Eugene office of the social security board, today explained the monthly benefits available in three selected examples.

These examples, Mr. Monroe said, are based on the employment of three workers who for these illustrations will be known as Smith, Brown and Jones. All three, it is assumed, have worked through 1937, 1938 and 1939 at jobs covered by the social security act and each has averaged \$150 per month in wages. The examples follow:

1. On next January 2, Mr. Smith becomes 65 years of age. He chooses to retire from employment. He has no dependent wife and no children under 18. Years of age. His benefit will amount to \$50.00 per month, starting with January and continuing to the time of his death.

2. On next January 2, Mr. Brown becomes 65 years of age and chooses to retire. He has a dependent wife who is also 65 years of age. Brown will receive \$50.00 per month and there will be an additional benefit of \$15.45 per month (one-half of \$30.90) for Mrs. Brown. Both payments will start with January and each will continue to the time of the recipient's death. If Mr. Brown should die previous to his wife, then Mrs. Brown's monthly payment will become three-fourths of her husband's benefit or \$38.18. She would then receive this amount until the time of her death.

3. On next January 2, Mr. Jones dies leaving a widow and two dependent children who are 8 and 11 years of age. In this case the widow will receive \$23.18 per month and each dependent child a monthly benefit of \$15.45, a total for this family of \$54.08. The payment to the widow will continue until she remarries or until the youngest child reaches the age of 16, or until the age of 18 if the child is attending school. A child's benefit would also be terminated by its marriage and the widow's benefit would cease if she did not have the children in her care.

Higher Pay, Higher Benefit. Commenting upon the above examples, Mr. Monroe pointed out that if the earnings in any of the above examples had been higher than \$150 per month, the benefits would also have been higher. Benefits would likewise have been less with a lower average monthly wage.

In each case a benefit would have been payable if the worker had been employed in at least six calendar quarters between January 1, 1937, and January 1, 1940, at jobs covered by the social security act and had earned at least \$50 in wages in each quarter. These are the minimum requirements to qualify on next January 1, Mr. Monroe said.

If a worker dies before next January 1, a lump sum settlement will be paid to the deceased's widow, children or near relatives. Monthly payments to surviving relatives will not be paid unless the worker dies after December 31, 1939.

Pamphlets describing the federal old-age and survivors insurance program with a scale of benefits may be obtained without charge at the Social Security Board, Room 9, Post Office building, Eugene, Oregon.

HIGH PRICES PAID FOR DUROC HOGS

If selling prices are any indication, there's plenty of confidence in the Duroc hog business right now. At least the Duroc breed secretary, B. R. Evans, reports two history-making Duroc transactions during the past month—one for \$6,000 and the other for \$4,000.

The \$6,000 was paid down by A. J. River ranch, Callerville, Tenn., for the entire Duroc herd of Dr. O. P. Bennett, Washington, Ill. This included the two well-known show and breeding boars, Grand Parade, 1939 Indiana grand champion, and Waveline, 1937 national grand champion at the cash price of \$3,000—highest selling price to be made in any hog breed for a number of years. The balance of the \$6,000 went for Dr. Bennett's 30 sows with litters and the second prize fall boar at the 1939 Illinois state fair.

The other significant Duroc transaction reported was the sale of Modernistic, second junior yearling at the 1939 Illinois state fair and owned by Sherer & Seranton, Jop, Ill., to S. I. Kincaid & Son, Fairfield, Ill., for \$1,000. This great boar is a son of Waveline and was the top-selling Duroc spring spring boar, at \$280, in the 1938 fall sale season.
