WOOL. BOSTON, Nov. 17.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"While there has been very little wool moved in the eastern seaboard markets, and apparently nothing at all in the west this week, there is a little better tone in the market and it would seem that prices have now declined to a point where trading may presently be resumed on a broader scale."

"With prospects that no Australian wool can be imported until well after the turn of the year and world markets down to a parity with the Australian purchase price, the market here is disposed to turn more to the wools which are available in the market or nearby, especially with South American markets turning upward again on French buying."

"The manufacturing outlook has not changed appreciably. Preparatory machinery activity is tapering off and new business is slow in piecemeal."

"Mohair continues slow and hardly changed notably."

HIGHWAY PROJECT BACKERS PRAISED

Praise for the work of A. C. Marsters and W. C. Harding of Roseburg, and C. H. Demaray of Grants Pass in connection with road and highway improvement is contained in an article which appeared Nov. 16 in the Oregon Journal. In his column, "Among Our Neighbors," Dean Collins, Journal writer, says:

A. C. Marsters and W. C. Harding of Roseburg, and C. H. Demaray of Grants Pass, have been working for 75 years on one job, and now they're out driving all over southern Oregon "breaking bottlenecks."

The mathematicians may seem a bit cockeyed, but when you realize that they have worked more than 25 years apiece on the job of getting better highways it adds up to a little better than 75 years. The "bottlenecks" are the bad stretches of the Pacific highway that slow down tourist travel and cause thousands of tourists to turn back before they are well into Oregon. Just at present the drive is on the survey from Wolf Creek to Grants Pass and Marsters, Harding and Demaray are on the go continually, taking to city council and to county commissioners, city and to county commissioners, and keeping the fire under everybody to push the work along.

The job is a big one and will take some six or seven years to clear up, even if they get going right now. A. C. Marsters, 80 years old a couple of weeks ago, and W. C. Harding is nearing the 80 mark, and while I haven't an estimate on C. H. Demaray, he's been pioneering on highways more than 25 years, and he's well along in years, too.

When one watches the unquenchable enthusiasm of these men one feels justified in hoping that they all live to be 100, so that they can get a few years of driving for themselves on the highways they are trying to give Oregon for the benefit of future generations.

EPIDEMIC OF FLU SHUTS THIRD SCHOOL

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 17.—(AP)—A third Josephine county school, that of O'Brien, closed its doors yesterday because of an epidemic of influenza and colds.

Kerby union high school, serving the entire Illinois valley, and Kerby elementary school closed earlier this week.

The number absent from Grants Pass schools increased from 282 to 325. It was not known how many actual cases were ill.

F. R. UPHOLDS FINNS SEEKING U. S. LOANS

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Finland has a perfect right to borrow money from American banks, President Roosevelt said today, but he told reporters there was nothing to stories the Baltic republic had stiffened her attitude toward Russia after obtaining promises of economic and financial aid from the United States.

No such help was promised, he said in response to questions.
