New Books Received Recently At Roseburg Public Library

LAND BELOW THE WIND, the 25000 Atlantic Non-Fiction prize book by Agnes Newton Keith. Agnes Keith is the American wife of an English official in one of the farthest outposts of the British Empire. Nothing in her upbringing in California, no course she took at the university, could have prepared her for the life she was to lead in North Borneo. Borneo is the third largest island in the world. It is a land of primitive tribesmen, a land of tropical heat and hurricanes, a land whose animals and forests are almost legendary. The seventy-five white men who rule North Borneo rule it much as they did in Kipling's day, and it is their story quite as much as her own that Mrs. Keith has to tell.

LOST SUNRISE, by Kathleen Norris. This is the story of two sisters, their husbands, their loves, their homes and children; in particular the story of Green Washburn, compelled to marry a man he did not love and of the unlooked-for assistance she found in this marriage, giving her life new meaning to bring to the eventual fulfillment of a great love. Mrs. Norris has written of Green and Sheila with all the enthusiasm and faith she holds for the ways and traditions of American life.

DRIFTERS GOLD, by Don Blanding. A certain man once offered Don Blanding a million dollars for his "secrets of laughter." Blanding couldn't collect because of that time he had the laughter, but didn't know the formula. His greatest secret of laughter has always been his ability to make high adventure of every hour of living.

I've squandered the gold that is mine. With carefree and spendthrift hands, Buying folly and sorrow and joy On the highways of many lands; But the gold that is mine from memories

That I've gleaned from the world's far ends, I've hoarded and saved against the day When I could share it with my friends.

It is this spirit which he wants to convey through his new collection of verses. In his old rambling redwood Vagabond's House, set among the cypress and oak of Carmel-by-the-Sea in California, Don Blanding has sifted and sorted the Drifters Gold, gleaned from the highways and byways of the world, to make this his most joyous volume.

MOMENT IN PEKING by Lin Yutang. The appearance of a novel of China, written in English but in the authentic manner of the

Chinese novelists, is a literary event of the first order, especially when it comes from the author of those famous works: My Country, And My People and The Importance of Living.

The scene is a moving panorama of contemporary China, covering nearly forty years, from the terror of the Boxer Rebellion in 1900 to the bitter excitement of the present Japanese invasion, a period of great social change and adjustments in the lives of a teeming humanity.

The author makes no plea for the old ways or for the new. Telling of Chinese people as he has known them, he presents modern China in flesh and blood, carrying a step further the interpretation given in his previous books. This is above all a tale of people.

A GOODLY FELLOWSHIP, by Mary Ellen Chase. A Maine rural school, where Miss Chase at the age of nineteen taught forty-nine boys and girls of all ages from four to twenty, makes the perfect opening scene for the story of her experiences during the past thirty years.

Miss Chase goes on to describe boardingschool teaching in the Middle West, teaching in the public schools of Montana, university extension work, and her life as a teacher in the University of Minnesota and in Smith College. There are chapters of study in Germany before the war; on graduate study; and on early experiences as a lecturer before every sort of audience. Like a kaleidoscope, "A Goodly Fellowship" pictures the changing ideas and ideals of American education through the past three decades. And in Miss Chase's informal way it bears witness to her love and understanding of her profession.

THE D. A. DRAWS A CIRCLE, by Eric Stanley Gardner. The story concerns a blood-stained suit, sent to the cleaner by mistake, more and more interesting; a naked man shot twice in the same place; a car whose speedometer registered just 50 miles on every trip it took; and a smooth, big-time lawyer who will remind many readers of one of the most familiar figures in criminal court practice today.

PRIZE STORIES OF 1939 edited by Harry Hansen. Each year the reading public looks to the O. Henry Memorial Award committee for the outstanding best of the year's crop of short stories. This is the twenty-first volume in the famous series, and the seventh under the brilliant editorship of Harry Hansen, distinguished literary critic of the New York World-Telegram. It is a collection of superb stories, representing the shorter work of America's outstanding writers.
