The theme for this series in the class in psychology is that of "Abnormal Psychology." This course is being given to meet popular demand for information on abnormal psychology, which has been defined as "the study of those forms of human behavior which differ sufficiently from those which are commonly accepted as normal to be recognized as different, irregular or disordered."

The speech class last week continued with studies in platform behavior, with special emphasis on gestures. Several of the class members have accepted parts in a play to be given a little later in one of the local churches as part of an annual program.

Doctor Leavitt was invited to speak before the Fullerton School Parent-Teachers association at 3:30 p. m., Monday, November 20th. Members and their friends found the talk helpful and interesting, and a large attendance enjoyed the meeting. Mrs. John G.
