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Roosevelt Back At Retreat in Georgia

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Nov. 22.—(AP)—The rods and golds which autumn lavished on the hills of Georgia gayly welcomed President Roosevelt back today to spend Thanksgiving and a few extra days at a famed infantile paralysis foundation.

A special train brought the president from Washington and he motored from the station to the little Pine Mountain cottage which he calls his "other home."

Like the heads of many a family in 22 states, President Roosevelt will carve a Thanksgiving turkey. His "family" at Thanksgiving time includes not only Mrs. Roosevelt but also a group of children and other patients at the infantile paralysis foundation.

Names of the children there were drawn from a hat yesterday to determine who would sit beside the president. Seven-year-old Ann Smith of Frankfort, Ky., was the lucky one. She has been a patient for five months, uses a wheelchair.

Processing Tax Will be Revived In Farm Policy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The latest effort to solve the farm problem finds the administration circling back to the famous processing tax idea, which was embodied in the original agricultural adjustment act, and which went out the window when the supreme court killed that act in 1936.

The court killed the first AAA, not because it objected to the processing tax, but because it felt that the tax was being used for an unlawful end—viz., the regulation of crop production. The plan which Secretary Henry Wallace is now formulating would not restrict production; it would, however, get the government out from under an annual expense of around a quarter of a billion dollars, and would provide a method of financing parity payments to growers of wheat, rice and cotton.

Congress holds purse strings. Parity payments now come directly out of the federal treasury. The agriculture department, for instance, may decide that the cotton grower needs a payment of two cents a pound on his produc-

tion in order to bring the net price he gets up to "parity."

But congress can always throw a last-minute wrench into the proceedings by refusing to appropriate the money for those payments. It almost did so last winter; and the item of \$200,000,000 which finally went into the agricultural appropriation bill for that purpose was largely responsible for shooting that bill up above the budget estimates.

Under the scheme now taking shape, the grower would get his money in just the same way—but the money wouldn't come from the treasury.

What he would get, originally, would be a certificate, entitling him to collect his parity payment.

Two Methods Open
This, in turn, could be figured in one of two ways: It could be a straight payment on his entire production, up to a maximum set by his farm's average yield over a period of years, or it could be an equivalent payment at a higher rate per pound based on that percentage of his production which the agriculture department deemed needed for the domestic market.

In either case, it would figure out to a total sufficient to boost his receipts for his crop to parity. And the money with which he could turn his certificate into cash would come from the processor who bought the cotton.

In substance, the processor would pay a tax of so much per pound on cotton bought for his mill; he would not pay his tax into the treasury, but would handle it either through a pool or through the banks.

Would Leave U. S. in Clear
The result would be that the transaction would not show up on the treasury books at all. The department of agriculture would

carry on with its soil conservation program, which runs to half a billion dollars this year, and presumably with its surplus commodities program, which is standing it close to \$200,000,000; but the parity program would be self-financing.

And since this particular processing tax would not act as a brake on production, but would be designed simply to raise the grower's price, the department figures it would get by the supreme court.

The department figures that this tax would not mean much of a rise in price for the consumer in the case of wheat and cotton. Processing costs, say the department experts, are the big item in cotton goods and flour.

They are doubtful, however, that the stunt could be applied to livestock; there, they say, a processing tax could and would be passed directly on the consumer.

Way of a Woman
