

O. S. C. Will Play U. C. L. A. Saturday

Hard-Fought Battle Looms at Los Angeles; Stanford to Clash With California.

(By the Associated Press) Pacific coast football fans already served with two spine-tingling games with their Thanksgiving turkey, look forward today to a couple of important clashes on California's gridiron tomorrow.

One game has little significance other than a tradition built up over 45 years of pigskin rivalry. The other is a stiff test between two interlocking conference elvans.

At Palo Alto, they'll see the 45th annual renewal of the Stanford-California classic, still the "big game" though both teams are at the bottom of the Pacific coast conference.

Of much more significance insofar as the conference is concerned is Oregon State's game at Los Angeles with the Bruins of the University of California at Los Angeles.

Both Have Good Records. Oregon State has lost only one conference game—that to the Rose Bowl-Amping Southern California Trojans—and is fresh from trouncing California last Saturday 21 to 0. U. C. L. A., unbeaten in the conference but tied 14-14 by Stanford, is tied with the Trojans for the league lead, but still has U. S. C. and Washington State on the schedule after Oregon State.

Southern California will be in South Bend playing Notre Dame in their annual get-together. Washington moved up into a fourth-place tie with Oregon in the conference race, each with three wins and three losses, by upsetting the Oregonians, 20 to 13, yesterday while the giant of the smaller schools, San Jose State, overwhelmed Fresno State, 42 to 7, to boom into the national pigskin picture in impressive fashion.

Sunday, Santa Clara will play Loyola at Los Angeles and Gonzaga will hook up with the University of Portland at Portland.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 24.—(AP)—The University of California at Los Angeles will put its No. 1 backfield into the starting lineup for the first time in several weeks when the Bruins clash with Oregon State in Memorial coliseum tomorrow.

Coach Horrell named a quartette that include Kenny Washington, and Jackie Robinson at the half-back posts, Ned Matthews at quarter and plunging Bill Overlin at fullback.

The possibility remains, however, that Horrell may change his mind and keep Robinson on the bench, saving him for a critical spot in the game that figures to be one of the hardest fought of the season.

Oregon Beaten By Washington, 20-13

SEATTLE, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Coach Tex Oliver summed it up in the University of Washington dressing room after the game.

"I just want to tell you fellows," he shouted, "that you played a great game."

And a great game the Huskies played yesterday as they turned in an upset 20-13 victory over Oregon—or, rather, over Jackrabbit Jay Graybeal—on Thanksgiving day here.

It was a dingdong battle, with both teams coming from behind twice and being tied once before crashing Jack Stackpool, soph Washington fullback, boomed nine yards for the winning score in the final quarter.

Heroes? There were two, Graybeal and the sensational triple-threat Husky halfback, Dean McAdams. Graybeal scored all of Oregon's 13 points, but it was McAdams who tossed the passes that broke the Webfoots' collective heart.

McAdams tossed 13 passes and completed eight of them for a net gain of 91 yards. Besides that, Dean packed the ball 19 times for 67 yards and his punting average, despite a blocked kick blamable on a poor center pass, was 26.5, or 3.1 yards better than the Oregon boots.

Graybeal only packed the ball three times, but he made 22 yards for a 7.57 average.

Medford Gridders Beat Coquille, 6-0

MEDFORD, Nov. 24.—Medford high school football squad defeated a stubborn underdog Coquille squad here Thursday, 6 to 0. Both teams were state title contenders.

Medford scored its lone touchdown in the third quarter, on a 35-yard pass from Newland to Piche, who crossed the goal line standing up after a 25-yard run. Piche's try for goal was blocked.

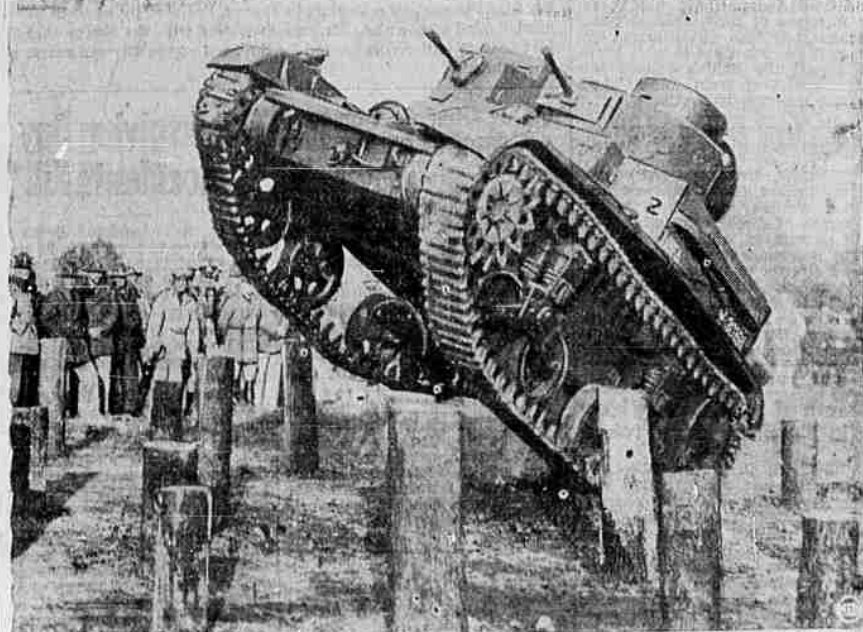

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Nanning Captured By Japanese Forces

HONGKONG, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Japanese army headquarters here announced tonight that Japanese forces had entered Nanning, Kwangsi province capital, early this afternoon.

The Japanese troops moved in to the city, which lies on a key supply route from French Indo-China, after artillery and air bombardment reduced its defenses, the announcement said.

The way was further prepared by thrusts of Japanese cavalry units which crossed the shallow Pearl river, on which Nanning lies.
