MARKET REPORTS

WOOL
BOSTON, Nov. 24.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "There has been a broadening of demand to include woolen descriptions in wool this week, though the trading is not more active. Prices appear to have levelled off approximately to a trading basis, although some manufacturers think the market is still somewhat lower before the buying of goods will resume in earnest. Meanwhile, activity in preparatory machinery is tapering off."

"Discussion of Australian wool allocations by Great Britain is the favorite topic of discussion here, there is the growing conviction that Australian wool will hardly commence to arrive in this country much before March. Meanwhile, mills will be dependent upon the remaining domestic wools and imports from South Africa and South America. Should consumers continue at anything like the recent rate, a pinch in wool supplies might easily occur."

"Western operations have been negligible again this week, asking prices being too high to permit trading."

"Mohair is still quiet and without notable change."
