McBain Freed on False Prefense Deal Charge

Estil T. McBain, arraigned yester-
day in a justice court at
Drain on a charge of obtaining

reported by Sergeant Paul Morgan
of the state police. McBain had
been accused of making a false
statement in connection with the
purchase of groceries from a store
at Drain. When taken into the
justice court for arraignment Mc-
Bain showed that the supplies had
been purchased for a camp where
he was employed and that the gro-
ceries had been delivered to the
camp in accordance with the state-
ment given the dealer. He dis-
claimed personal responsibility for
payment.

WAR 25 Years Ago Today

Bulletins in
ROSEBURG REVIEW

November 28, 1914

PETROGRAD—The Russians are
vigorously attacking the German
entrenched positions in the Lodz,
Zdunska, Segiers and Wola dis-
tricts, where a large detachment
of General Von Hindenburg's
troops are surrounded, and in dan-
ger of destruction, according to
unofficial advices from the front.

PARIS—That a German cruiser,
believed to be the Bertha, was
sunk near Libau, was asserted in
a Petrograd dispatch received by
the newspaper Le Matin. The same
dispatch contained an unconfirmed
report that the German battleship
Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse was tor-
pedoed and sunk in the Baltic sea.

LONDON—The Germans are
withdrawing from the Belgian
coast, according to a Rotterdam
dispatch to the Daily Mail, and con-
centrating at Antwerp. It is stated
heavy firing was heard Friday
in the direction of Zebrugge,
which evidently is being bombard-
ed by the allies' warships off the coast.

AMSTERDAM—German aviators
have bombarded the French port of
Dunkirk. Numerous houses were
damaged and one man was struck.
