

Beaver Band Wins In Court Verdict

SALEM, Nov. 28.—(AP)—A lit-tle band of Oregon beavers, whose work at constructing a dam to control erosion caused by a Malheur county stream was far more effective than that of their employer, won a supreme court decision today approving their labors.

Paul Stewart, who lives on Crane creek, built three dams to prevent erosion on his land, but all of them washed out. Then he got 16 beavers from the state game commission, and they built a dam that lasted.

But Lloyd L. Johnson, who lives on the stream below Stewart, brought suit charging the beaver dam was depriving him of water to irrigate and to water his stock. He wanted \$650 damages.

Circuit Judge Charles W. Ellis, ruling against the beavers, ordered Stewart to tear down the dam. Stewart refused, and was found in contempt of court.

In today's decision by Justice Dean, Judge Ellis was reversed. The high court, finding that Stewart and the beavers had a right to control erosion, gave him a vote of thanks for doing it by himself without waiting for federal government help.

Treasure Hunt So Far Yields Watch

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 28.—(AP)—A hole eight feet deep and a rusty watch stood out today as the tangible results of Hollywood Bowl's treasure hunt.

The hole represented the combined labors of a half-dozen men yesterday. The watch turned up at the six-foot level. It apparently was of fairly recent origin, but how it got there no one would guess.

Using an excavator device called a "doodlebug" and defying a legend which says a curse has killed eight other searchers, the shovelers dug below the bowl's parking lot, looking for \$200,000 which a frightened Mexican shepherd buried somewhere in Calaveras pass 74 years ago.

Henry Jones, Seattle mining engineer, is directing the hunt. Frank Hoekstra operates the "doodlebug," a complicated collection of wires, electrodes, dials and a big needle which supposedly registers in the presence of buried metal. It is called "doodlebug" because as the hunters press it deeper, and at times seemed barely able to contain itself.

A deputy sheriff sat by watching the proceedings—assigned to protect the county's 50 per cent of anything found. The bowl is public property and Jones agreed to split any profits.
