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ONCE again the state of Oregon is pioneering in a movement which will very shortly become national in its scope. The effort this time is to break down trade barriers between the states so that a truck or automobile driver may cross any and all state lines without being compelled to pay a tax or fee.

Secretary of State Earl Snell, chairman of the committee on reciprocity of the National Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators, is recognized as one of the prime movers in this fight. Oregon is pioneering in this field, just as it was the first state to levy the gas tax and the first to build a modern, concrete highway system.

Nowadays a truck operator who sends his trucks through several states has a pretty tough time of it. He has to pay tribute to all of the states. Some of them charge fees of astronomical proportions.

This system, under which each state seeks the trucks of other states, amounts to a burden on interstate commerce. It isn't limited only to trucks, since some states charge tourists registration fees.

The council on state governments recently started work on the problem by suggesting all states adopt a proposed uniform law. This will take a lot of time because many state legislatures, under pressure of the truck lobbies of their own states, will be reluctant to reduce the fees charged out-of-state trucks.

The federal government, however, recently raised a howl that might bring results. First, Secretary of Commerce Hopkins protested, and he was seconded by Secretary of the Interior Ickes.

Then the federal bureau of public roads got down to business, suggesting at a meeting in San Francisco last spring of the nation's motor vehicle administrators that states which refuse to break down their trade barriers against other states might lose their federal road money. This would mean that those states which refuse reciprocity would lose all their federal aid road projects.

The government's position is that the federal road funds given states more than make up for the loss in fees which would result from full reciprocity.

The point made by the federal people is mighty well taken. We get so busy with our detailed problems in our various subdivisions of government that occasionally we forget that each subdivision is but a single part of a whole. We do not live on a continent where there are frontiers separating groups of people. Ours is a nation of 48 states—not a vast area divided up into 48 different units of government.

Odd Fellowship Celebrated Here

Lodges Hold Joint Patriotic Program; Essay Prizes Offered School Students.

Joining in the nation-wide patriotic celebration of the fraternity, the Odd Fellows lodge of Roseburg held a joint program with the Rebekahs at the lodge hall here last night. A large audience was in attendance.

The program opened with the presentation of the flag and the singing of the national anthem, followed by invocation by Rev. C. A. Edwards. Music for the presentation and singing was furnished by an orchestra directed by J. D. "Sonny" Gilmore.

A statement concerning the nation-wide patriotic program of the lodge was given by Ralph L. Russell, special deputy grand master, chairman of the local committee. Vocal solos, "God Bless America" and "America, The Beautiful," were sung by Lowell Russell, accompanied at the piano by Miss Betty Masters. An address was made by Harris Ellsworth, editor of the Roseburg News-Review, after which the orchestra presented a medley of patriotic music, followed by a brief address by A. C. McGee and benediction by Dr. Edwards.

The committee in charge of the program consisted of Mr. Russell, Roy Young and Oliver Plummer. Refreshments were served by a committee consisting of W. O. Peterson, Harry Taylor and George Leomin.

Announcement was made that the grand master, O. F. Steele, had posted a prize of \$25 for the best essay to be submitted to him by an Oregon high school student. The local lodge voted to offer cash prizes of \$5 and \$2 for the two best essays to be written on patriotic subjects by students in the Roseburg high school.

A grant store of food will be turned over to the Salvation Army for its relief work as a result of the hundreds of contributions being received from boys and girls of Roseburg and vicinity who are exchanging articles of food for tickets of admission to Saturday's Christmas show. L. A. Rhoden, chairman of the program committee, announced today.

All boys and girls up to the age of 15 years, may obtain tickets to the show by contributing one or more potatoes or other articles of staple food. These contributions may be left at any Roseburg store as all merchants have tickets available.

Students are advised by Mr. Rhoden to hold all articles of food contributed until Monday, at which time collection will be made by the Lingham Transfer company.

Saturday's show, according to Lamm Radabaugh, theater manager, will start at 9 a. m. and will run continuously until 2 p. m. The show will feature the Italian theater and if enough seats are not available, there, the show theater will be opened to accommodate the overflow. The picture program will include a "Hollywood Cassidy" picture, a Zane Grey picture, "Mysterious Rider" and a Popeye cartoon.

DR. CHARLES A. EDWARDS

"By grace are ye saved through faith." These words are short and plain enough to be understood by young children. Their message seems difficult for many adults to grasp. Non-Christian faiths do not teach the truth of our text. Their followers are seeking salvation by penances and pilgrimages, by fasting and sometimes torture, by sacrifices and self denials. In so-called Christian lands a similar error is often found. Salvation will come by prayer, by Bible study, by church attendance, by stewardship of life. These are all good, but salvation comes by faith. Does that mean we are not to be faithful in Christian activities? St. Paul answers this age-old question. Works do not procure salvation. They prove that salvation has been procured, the more we know and appreciate the salvation God has given us, the more devoted to His work we will be. Our lives should give evidence of our gratitude. Amen.

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Rules Governing Child Board Given

The state public welfare commission has issued rules and regulations governing the licensing of private commercial boarding homes for children under the age of 18 years, in accordance with provisions of a law enacted by the last legislative assembly of Oregon.

Applications for certification and information may be obtained from Douglas county public welfare commission office located at Roseburg, says John L. Dittenderfer, executive secretary.

The law provides that persons operating foster homes commercially and for profit for the care of children under 18 years of age shall make application to and be certified by the state public welfare commission. The rules and regulations issued by the commission exclude four types of homes: 1. School dormitories, 2. Homes in which children are placed for the purpose of attending a school not accessible from the child's own home, 3. Boarding homes in which children are placed by institutions or agencies licensed by the commission to place children in families, 4. Homes of families boarding children who are related to them.

No charge is made for certification. The purpose of certification is to provide foster home care which will be conducive to the general welfare, health and education of children who are dependent upon boarding home care.

The law applies to all private boarding homes operated commercially and for profit which have one or more children under the age of 18 years whether the care is paid by the parents of such children, from public funds or from other sources.
