Albany Office Tops Job Giving Units

SALEM, Dec. 6.—(AP)—The Albany office of the state employment service led the state by finding jobs during November for 1,603 persons. Portland was second with 978.

Figures for other cities included: Klamath Falls 552, Eugene 377, Roseburg 339, Newport 313, Salem 256, Ontario 302, Corvallis 205, Medford 53 and Pendleton 35.

Representatives of employers, workers and the public attended a hearing here today to assist the state unemployment compensation commission in determining how large its reserve fund should be to protect it from insolvency. The 1939 legislature ordered the commission to establish the permanent size of the fund by next January 1.

Jobless benefits last week totaled \$64,027, largest in five months, while the commission's reserve fund went below the \$5,000,000 mark for the first time in two months.

Stockmen, Farmers Rap Reciprocal Trade Pact

DENVER, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Protective tariffs for American agriculture will regain their old-time importance in the 1940 legislative and political scenes if western livestock and farm interests have their way.

Without a dissenting voice, representatives from five western states submitted to a republican congressional "listening" committee today a resolution denouncing the present reciprocal trade agreement program as "un-American" and "un-constitutional."

Other resolutions demanding either higher tariffs or at least retention of present duties on cattle and sheep products, sugar, beans, and other commodities produced on western lands also were given the committee.

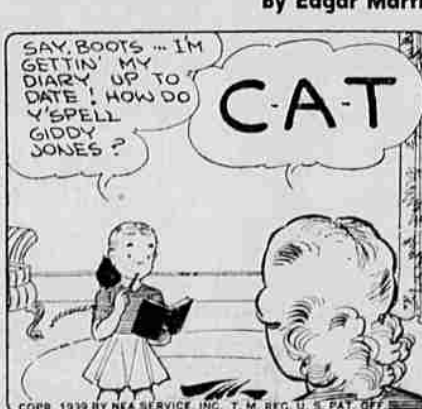
