Mrs. Effie Calkins, 79, widow of Frank L. Calkins, for many years assessor of Douglas county, died suddenly Wednesday at her home in Edenhower as the result of a heart ailment.

Mrs. Calkins was engaged in preparation of her lunch, when she was stricken with a heart attack. She went to the davenport to rest and died almost immediately.

Mrs. Calkins was born at McHenry, Ill., and the family came to Douglas county in 1885. Mr. and Mrs. Calkins had celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary prior to his death in April 1938.

Dr. Roach Skeptical of Lasting Peace in Europe

Dr. Morris H. Roach, Presbyterian minister, in a talk last night before the Roseburg Lions club, stated the belief that the war in Europe had no aim on which a lasting peace could be made, due to the diplomatic tangle in which Europe finds herself. If the allies win, the restoration of Poland and other dismembered countries would be impossible without first dealing with other powers, he argued. Such an eventual, Dr. Roach believes, would face the allied powers with an even greater problem of what to do with Germany and her people. A return to the republic would be an admission of failure; communism would be an unthinkable menace, and dismemberment or occupation would be highly impractical. These things, he believes, are the reasons why the war on the western front is tame, as compared to the war in 1914.
