Ex-FHA Counsel Named Utility Head

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Roger J. Whitford, former general counsel of the federal housing administration, has been named president of the Associated Gas and Electric company in a reorganization for the announced purpose of complying with the utility holding company act of 1935.

The company fought bitterly against passage of the act, which calls for geographical integration of such firms and, in some cases, simplification of their structure. Resignation of J. I. Minge, as president, chairman and director "because of ill health," was announced yesterday. Whitford was immediately elected general counsel and a director, as well as president.

Whitford said he would give attention at once to simplifying the corporate structure of the gigantic concern and integrating or consolidating its properties and operations.

He said there was need for "far-reaching economies in management" and pledged readjustments which would save the system more than \$500,000 annually.

Associated Gas and Electric, through a subsidiary, applied to the RFC last month for a \$25,500,000 loan. The money, it was said, was to be used to pay back taxes, redeem bonds and carry out a construction program.

Jerry L. Thornton Of Oakland Dies

Jerry Luke Thornton, 86, pioneer resident of Oakland and Douglas county, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. R. P. Moore, at Green Valley, last night. He was born in Missouri, March 21, 1853, and came to Oregon and Douglas county when he was a young man. Mr. Thornton taught school for some years in the Nonpareil vicinity, where he married Rebecca H. Hunt in 1875. After his marriage he purchased a farm and operated it until about 20 years ago, when he retired.

He spent almost a lifetime in this county with the exception of a few years when he lived near Portland. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. R. F. Moore, Green Valley, and Mrs. Jenny Wagner, Portland; two sons, Ernest E. of Sutherlin; Geary V. of Cottage Grove, and a brother, J. J. Thornton, of Eugene.

Mr. Thornton was a member of the Swedenburg church. Services will be held at the Christian church at Oakland Friday afternoon, Dec. 15, at 2 o'clock. Rev. R. W. Tindall will officiate at the service, and interment will follow at Fair Oaks cemetery at Oakland. Arrangements for the funeral are in charge of Stearns mortuary at Oakland.
