

### Indian Hoopsters Beat Springfield

Third Non-Conference Battle Won 33-15; High Scoring Honors Taken by Sanders.

Coach Jim Watta's Orange and Black hoop team won its third straight game by turning back an invincible Miller quintet from Springfield 35 to 15, in a non-conference tilt played last night on the senior high court. The Indians played brilliant ball during the first two quarters, connecting for 10 field goals out of 20 shots and at the same time holding the visitors to a pair of foul shots the first period and two field goals in the second with an unimpeachable defense. Half-time scores favored Roseburg, 21 to 6. High point honors went to the Indians' (inv.) but very clever, guard, Virg Sanders, with 11 markers, eight of them swishing through in the first period. Billy Goodlow, a reserve center, almost stole the show during the first quarter by sinking three field goals, but six points sufficed to tie with Springfield's McCready in the runner-up position. Earl Ward, the sharp-shooting left forward and center, was held to five tallies.

Statistics showed the Indians' superiority in almost every department. Roseburg took 48 shots as the basket, rang the bell for 15, for a shooting percentage of 37.7. Springfield had 37 attempts to score, made only five good for 13.5 per cent. Watta's eagles were even better on the free throw line, dropping three out of six rift shots through the hoop. The Millers had to be content with but five out of 17. The locals even outpersonal-fouled them, committing 12 violations to their opponents' alk.

Roseburg really went to town the first two quarters. Sanders broke away almost immediately after the Indians took the tip-off to sink a crumple. Virg got another from under the basket shortly after. He ker potted a 3-pointer from the center to make it 6-0 for the Red. Virg with but a minute and 15 seconds played. Springfield took time out to talk over the situation but the Indians were "hot" and couldn't be stopped. Ward missed a foul but Sanders came back with his third layup shot to bring the Indians' almost unerring marksmanship to four shots—four baskets. Pollard, the tall Miller center, broke the scoring ice for his team by sinking a charity toss for their first field about midway through the period.

The Wattans looked like a real ball club the first two stanzas, but bogged down and almost fixated out during the final two quarters. Springfield tightened its defense to hold the Indians to a single foul conversion, that by Ward, in the third canto and it wasn't until midway through the final eight minutes that Roseburg garnered its first field goal, and that by Goodlow, who had replaced Ed Hughes. Billy followed one-hander and that basket fired up the Indians and started them driving again.

The whole Indian squad of 10 men were used in the fray. Sanders and Baker turned in some beautiful ball-hawking work while Ward, Puckett, Hughes and Goodlow did a nice job stargazing the backboard. Outside of some ragged ball-handling at times and the mental and physical let-down in the last two quarters, the Indians undoubtedly turned in their best game of the season. Pollard and McCready were outstanding for Springfield.

The next game for the Indians will be against a strout Alumni squad, here, December 20.

### Paintings Said Not Of Shakespeare

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—(AP)—X-ray evidence that three world-famous paintings supposedly of William Shakespeare actually are of the Earl of Oxford—interpreted as corroborating the theory that the earl was the real author of "Shakespeare's" plays—was reported today by Charles W. Barrell, photographic expert and prominent Shakespearean student. After three years' research and investigation with X-ray and infrared ray photography, Barrell said in an article in the forthcoming issue of Scientific American magazine that he was convinced the portraits had been "doctored" soon after Oxford's death to conceal evidences of nobility and protect the family name from the contemporary stigma of connection with the theater.

The pictures are the "Ashbourne" portrait, of uncertain authorship, in the Folger Shakespeare library at Washington, D. C.; the "Janse" Shakespeare in the same gallery, and the "Hampton Court" Shakespeare in the British royal collection.
