Class Dinner Party Is Enjoyed

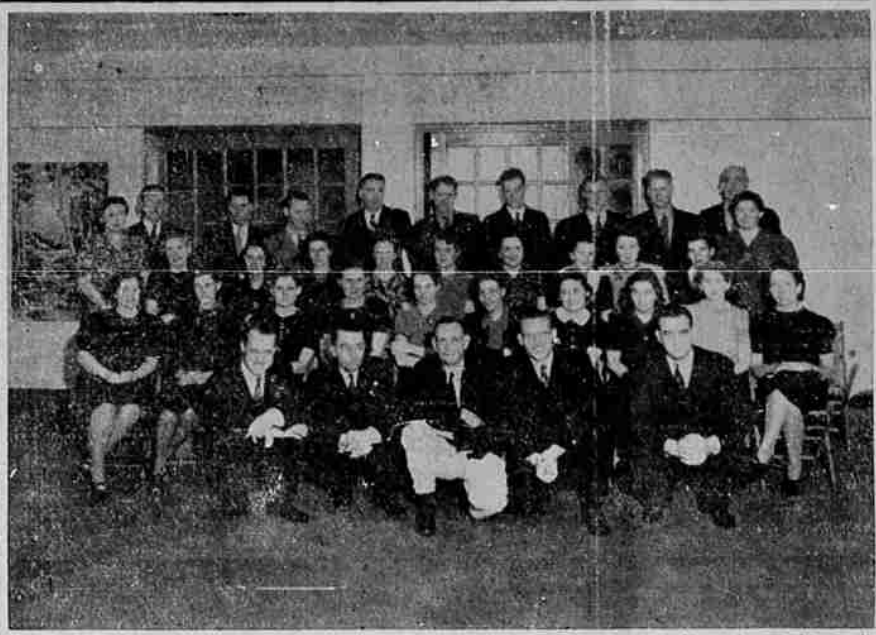
