Waldridge Trial Given Later Date

Postponement of trial of Earl Waldridge, local restaurant cook, charged in justice court here with drunken driving, was announced today by Justice of the Peace H. W. Masters. The case originally was scheduled for trial today but postponement to the date of Jan. 2 has been ordered. Judge Masters said, because of the fact that Harry Hatfield, injured when struck by the automobile allegedly driven by Waldridge, is still being treated for injuries and is not available as a witness; and also because of the request of the defendant's attorney for more time in which to investigate the case. A complaint also was filed charging Waldridge with failure to stop at the scene of an accident. A demurrer filed to that complaint has not yet been argued.

Student Conclave Hears From F. R.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 27.—(AP)—A message from President Roosevelt encouraging discussion of "the real issues that confront our country" launched the American Student union today on its fifth annual convention.

The president's message to Joseph P. Lash, national secretary, was presented to 400 delegates from colleges, universities and high schools as they assembled at the memorial union on the University of Wisconsin campus for a four-day appraisal of world events, with war topics receiving major attention.

An evaluation of the soviet union, with probable emphasis on hostilities in Finland, was scheduled for tonight. One of the principal speakers will be Earl Browder, general secretary of the communist party in America.

The symposium, announced as a last minute feature, aroused interest among Wisconsin students and faculty members because of denial of speaking privileges to Browder recently on eastern campuses.

President Clarence A. Dykstra declared, however, the university had sanctioned a meeting of the
