G. O. P. Leaders Plan "Surprises"

Campaign Strategy May Take Form After Jackson Day Democratic Feast.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Republican party officials hinted today some strategic "surprises" may be sprung on the democrats early in the new year as a warm-up for the 1940 presidential election.

One official at national headquarters, across the street from the white house, almost let the cat out of the bag by saying:
"The democrats will kick off first in the nine months' political game of 1940, with their Jackson day dinners Jan. 8, and the republicans will do their first kicking at Lincoln day banquets Feb. 12. But watch out, because the republicans may pull an intercepted pass."

This was taken to mean the republicans plan to put a "publicity" team on the field sometime between Jan. 8 and Feb. 12, but the party man helping to call the signals now thought it would be even earlier. In other words, his metaphor about the "intercepted pass" was a little ill-timed.

"We are going to light down the line issue by issue," said the official in discussing broad plans for the campaign.
Questions Arise
This brought up many questions, such as: Is the party prepared financially for the campaign? Who is going to raise the issues and what will they be? Where will the republicans concentrate their fire? First, the republican war chest is now being filled, at least partially, with individual donations up to \$1,000 to erase a \$655,000 deficit left from previous campaigns. Leaders say that the contributions are coming in as well as can be expected. A spirited drive for post-convention campaign expenses will get under way later.

Second, the way pre-congress controversies have been going, it appears that there will be as many issues as candidates. And there are at least a dozen—avowed or potential—of the latter.

Third, the republicans, as in former quadrennial elections, are generally expected to send most of their money and campaign orators into the big, populous states of the east and middle west. That is where the all-important electoral votes are.

Republicans also will be seeking to retain and build up their 1938 congressional gains, when they picked up eight senate seats and 81 house seats, with 13 of the latter in Ohio, 12 in Pennsylvania, and 8 in Wisconsin.

Bill Would Ease Finns' Debt Load

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Rep. Smith (D., Wash.) announced today he would introduce on the opening day of congress next week a bill to relieve Finland from making further payments on this time on her debt to the United States and to loan her the amounts she already has paid.

(Finland borrowed \$8,281,926 and has paid \$5,656,598. Her debt with interest figured, now stands at \$8,142,990. Her regular semi-annual payments have been practically all interest.)

Smith said his bill would relieve Finland of making further payments on the debt until such time as congress shall require and authorize loaning her the \$5,656,598 until "she is in condition to repay the amount."

He said "Finnish people have won the admiration of the United States and the world. The action proposed in my bill is a friendly gesture and helpful to Finland in the crisis. It would not be a gift, for I believe the Finns too proud to accept one, but it would be substantial aid and would not violate our neutrality."
