temptants. Mrs. Mathebat attempted to cover that territory which the national president, Mrs. Wilma Corwith, does not. Southern Oregon was most happy to have one of their national officers visit their district.

Mrs. Young and Mrs. Ted Post are also urging, as a last warning, all those eligibles who have not rejoined the auxiliary to do so at once. The membership will have only just time to reach national headquarters by the expiration date. It is a very inspiring and lively thing to see the honor guard pins worn by those members who have made themselves eligible to wear them by having a continuous membership for at least five years. Should one not join one year she would need to start again. These pins are presented by national and are in themselves worth working for. Mrs. Young explained. She urged all women not current members to keep their records intact by sending their registration in now. Mrs. Post, membership chairman, reports a larger percentage enrolled locally at this time, than at the same time last year. Nationally, more than 250,000 enrollments had been reported on December 1, an increase of 20,000 over the same date last year.

With the convening of congress, January 3rd, the Legion and auxiliary will start working for the passage of legislation needed for the peace and security of the United States, for the protection of American ideals and institutions, and for just compensation and care of veterans and dependent families. Full support of the auxiliary will be given to the new five-point legislative program of the legion, according to Mrs. Thomas Parkinson, legislative chairman of Uniqua unit.

The five points adopted at the November meeting of the Legion's national executive committee, are:

1. Universal service.
2. National defense.
3. Protection for widows and orphans of World War veterans.
4. Veterans' employment and preference in government employment.
5. Tightening of immigration, naturalization and denaturalization laws.

"Ever since the World War, the legion and auxiliary have been asking for enactment of a law which would make special profits from war impossible and which would provide equal service for all in event of war," said Mrs. Parkinson.

"Need for strengthened national defense to guard America's peace is now obvious, and we will urge congress to make adequate appropriation for this purpose."

"At present only those widows and orphans of veterans with disabilities proved to have been received in the war are eligible for government aid. We believe this protection should be extended."

"As long as millions of Americans are without employment, we believe that no more aliens should be admitted to the country. We feel that those aliens who advocate overthrow of the American form of government, or who are convicted of crimes should be deported, and we are seeking stronger laws to
