SEATTLE, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Some people collect towels on their European trips, says Prof. Vernon M. McKenzie, director of the school of journalism of the University of Washington, but a different kind of souvenir upon his return yesterday from seven and a half months abroad—83 pounds, gross weight, of propaganda.

He said that the German propaganda has failed and that generally the German propaganda has combined the deep understanding of an adolescent with the finesse of a professional wrestler.

The German propagandist machine, he said, is something like a man playing a harp while wearing a pair of mittens. The harpist lacks interest in what he is doing and his technique is formidable but what comes out is neither pleasant nor very convincing.

"They are ind-fatigable beggars, but they have failed," he said. This he attributed to an inherent German inability to understand other peoples. "Diplomatically Germany is still in the elementary grades," McKenzie said.

British propaganda, too, has failed in some instances, he said, citing the leaflet-bombings early in the war which called on the German people to make a sacrifice for their leaders and to make a sacrifice.

Nickle, 55, unemployed laborer, was held under police guard at the hospital today following the announcement of his estranged wife, Elsie, 42, in what Detective Captain C. J. Osborne said was "murder and attempted suicide."

Mrs. Nickle died last night from loss of blood caused when her jugular vein was slashed. The couple's daughter, Leola, 14, saw her mother's neck and facial cuts when she attempted to protect her mother, Osborne reported.

Last night, the detective captain said, he took to the home of his wife and daughter after visiting brief moments at the hospital. He announced: "If I can't live here, I'll never leave this house alive."

Mrs. Nickle replied "It doesn't make much difference," Osborne said. "Nickle moved toward her and she fled out the front door. I caught her on the front lawn and slashed her with a knife."

"The daughter was out when she tried to protect her mother. Nickle ran away from two neighbors who tried to prevent the attack. Leola was lying on the front porch when he went inside the house. I found him sitting in a rocking chair. His throat was badly slashed," Osborne said.

Hospital attendants said Nickle suffered deep neck wounds and described his condition as "fair." His daughter's condition is good.

Robert Hoover, national chairman of the Finnish relief fund, reported that a total of \$161,073 was collected up to December 24 by 23,000 contributors. The fund has received 1,200 newspapers in all parts of the country that helped finance the fund.

Hoover said many other newspapers were handing contributions until they could send in a single sizeable check.

The former president stressed it is an announcement that of every dollar donated to the relief fund, 90 cents goes to Finland, "with administrative costs being met by private subscription."

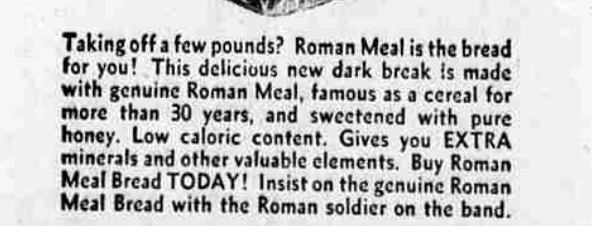
