Hope For Highway Assistance Given

GRANTS PASS, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Senator Charles L. McNary believes that we can expect some major assistance from the federal government in development of the Pacific highway. He wired Carl Rynearson in a telegram forwarded to County Judge W. A. Johnson.

Rynearson, manager at Eugene of the Oregon Pacific Highway association, said McNary's telegram offered good prospects in spite of the "economy drive."

Rynearson quoted results from a questionnaire among businessmen along the highway: "Do you consider the question of the Pacific highway between Roseburg and Grants Pass a more important factor than the lack of proper advertising north of Grants Pass for the fact that more than 50 per cent of the out-of-state cars on the Pacific highway at Grants Pass do not come any farther north?"

Exactly twice as many blamed condition of the highway as the lack of advertising, Rynearson said.

Mrs. Law Murder Clue Said Found

ABERDEEN, Wash., Jan. 8.—(AP)—Investigators of the slaying of Mrs. Dick Law today centered their efforts on a hunt for two lethal weapons—one a heavy blunt instrument, perhaps an iron pipe, and the other a stiletto-like blade with which the 24-year-old wife of a C. I. O. union official was stabbed deeply six times almost at the moment of death from blows on the head.

Criminologist Luke May left here late last night with several pieces of evidence, including two pieces of pipe which he proposed to test in his Seattle laboratory for blood traces. May has been employed as a special investigator by Grays Harbor county.

Meanwhile, questioning of Law about events preceding the brutal slaying last Friday night continued, as did that of various other persons, including Mr. and Mrs. Nestor Luoma, parents of the slain woman. The Luomas who shared a house with the Law's discovered Mrs. Law's body in the living room of the home, where she had been left alone for the evening with her sleeping three-year-old son. The Luomas were closeted for two hours yesterday with Prosecutor Stanley Krause, who had told newspapermen earlier that officers were still following "one good elaborate" in the case. He did not elaborate.

Law, subjected to intensive questioning Saturday, talked freely to newspapermen yesterday. He said he still believed the slaying "is the result of my union activities" and admitted having given police several suggestions as to persons who might, he believed, have been involved. Answering a direct question about persons he knew in the Oregon State prison while serving a two-year burglary sentence imposed in 1932, he said:

"I haven't a single enemy in the world who was with me there."

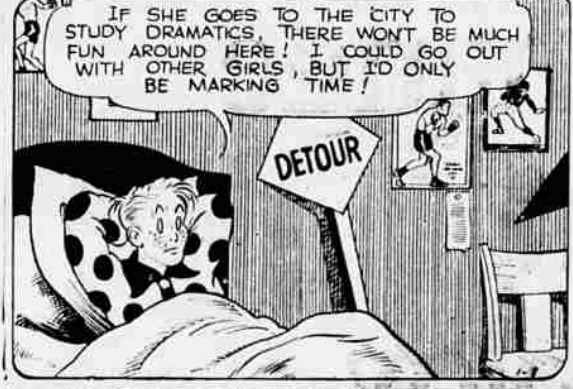

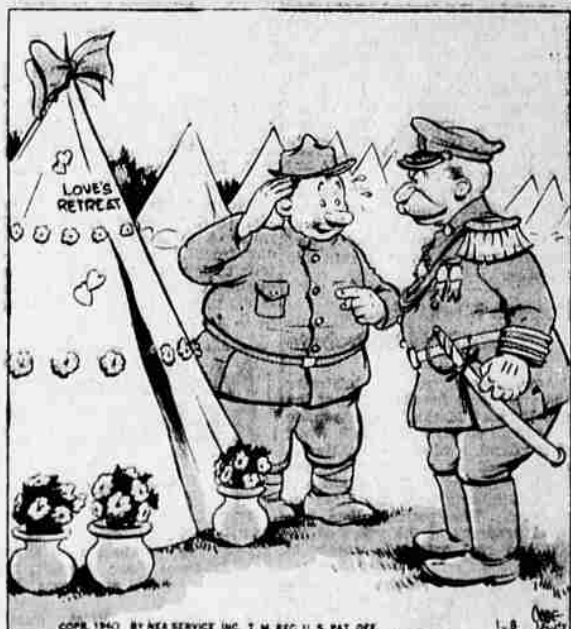
