cal recommendations of its own. Harrison had told the senate he would ask immediate approval of the proposal, but withheld his request after Minority Leader McNary served notice he would object unless the proposed joint committee were instructed specifically to study defense appropriations and to make a survey "of national military policy."

Under senate rules, a single objection can prevent immediate consideration of a resolution which has not been considered by a senate committee.

Harrison said he had no objection to McNary's suggestion, but Senator Hynes (D., S. C.) said he would block consideration of the Harrison plan if the Mississippi senator accepted McNary's proposal.

Harrison previously had claimed white house sympathy for his plan, but it has met opposition from various other quarters, and there were indications it might be allowed to gather dust in a house pigeonhole until the 1941 post-election congress meets.

A demand that reciprocal trade agreements with 21 foreign nations be scrapped was sent to congress today by the American Federation of Labor.

The federation's voice was added to the opposition to the administration trade program through the wage earners' protective conference, AFL tariff group. It came out against continuing the president's power to exchange tariff concessions with other countries. The battle over the trade agreements will be formally opened Thursday when the house ways and means committee begins hearings on a resolution to continue the program for three years. The present authority expires on June 12.

tion was that the navy sought fewer but larger warships.

Stark emphasized the proposed 25 percent increase would place this country's navy in a better relationship with that of Japan's. He emphasized that "we know little of what anybody is doing today."

It is reasonable to suppose, he added, that "those nations now at war are building to the maximum augmented wartime capacity of their shipbuilding activities. All other considerations aside, if the United States does not take immediate action toward increasing the strength of its fleet, the end of the present war will find us in a relatively weak naval position."

"A substantial expansion approximating 25 percent of our navy should be planned and undertaken at once."

Chairman Vinson (D., Ga.) of the naval committee originally announced the proposed 25 percent increase in the fleet's tonnage would provide 95 warships and 31 auxiliaries.

Douglas National Bank Activity Upped in 1939

More activity and improvement in all departments were reported by the Douglas National bank on publishing its annual statement today.

In the six months period just ended for 1939 the bank reports that loans and discounts have increased approximately \$145,000 and deposits \$160,000.

Turnover of individual accounts was more rapid in the period, with a substantial increase in customers at the close.

Checking activity through December, in comparison with the same month in other years, was much greater.

Deposits for the month held up well.

The number of loans to individuals through the entire year were greater than in any other period in the bank's history.

Diamond Lake Access Now Latest of Forestry Note

Diamond lake, at the summit of the Cascade range in the Umpqua national forest, remained open to travel today, the latest the lake has been accessible since the area been under the control of the forest service. Supervisor V. V. Harpam reported. Although the temperature dropped Saturday night to zero, Sunday's weather was clear and warm. Only five inches of snow has fallen at the lake so far this season. Snow usually measures from six to eight feet in depth by this time of year, Mr. Harpam states.

At Big Camas ranger station, 25 miles west of Diamond lake, there was only one-fourth of an inch of snow on the ground Sunday and this was washed away by rain this morning.

Herman Marks' Estate Admitted to Probate

Appointment of administrator and appraisers for the estate of the late Herman Marks has been made in probate court, where Ruth Wolff of Portland, a niece of Mr. Marks, was named as administrator and H. 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U. S. CONSULTS WITH FINNS ON REQUESTS FOR HELP

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The state department informed the league of nations today it was consulting directly with Finland on Finnish requests for material and humanitarian assistance.

On instructions from Secretary Hull, the American minister at Bern, Switzerland, replied today to a league inquiry as to what extent the American government was willing to help Finland.

"The government of the United States has from the outbreak of hostilities given tangible indication of its sympathy for the people and government of Finland in the present situation."

The American Red Cross and American private organizations already have extended medical, financial and other aid to the Finnish people, the note said, and are in consultation with Finnish agencies "with regard to the most effective manner in which such aid may be continued and expanded."

BERLIN, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Authorized Nazi sources today confirmed reports that Germany had refused

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to permit Italian planes destined for Finland to pass through the reich.

These sources said no nation under international law was obliged to accept war material as transit goods. Each such case must be decided on its merits, they held.

Russia, they asserted, would have objected violently if the planes had been allowed to pass, and Germany deemed it expedient to refuse such transit as a means of preventing extension of the war area.

Snow, Severe Cold Hit Most of United States

The temperature was seven above. At Fayetteville, in northwestern Arkansas, the thermometer read two above zero, the lowest in four years. Throughout the state sledging parties enjoyed a popularity they have not had for several years.

It was snowing in Kansas, where five inches of snow fell Saturday, and a new cover of snow in Iowa ranged up to seven inches. Wisconsin and Illinois had more than two inches of snow yesterday.

Death Toll 53
Except in the mountains, there were no snow flakes in California, but a general rain in the southern part of the state was approaching the two-inch mark.

Deaths attributable directly and indirectly to the weather over the week-end totaled 53—15 in Ohio, 12 in Pennsylvania, nine in Indiana, five in West Virginia, four in Arkansas, three each in Missouri and Minnesota, and two in California.

OREGON COAST WARNED OF STORM; COLD GRIPS STATE

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Southeast storm warnings fluttered along the coast from Eureka, Calif., to Tatoosh Island, Wash., today, while cold winds and overcast skies kept Oregon temperatures down.

The federal weather bureau predicted unsettled weather tonight and Tuesday with light intermittent snow or rain in eastern Oregon and rain in the west.

Moderately heavy snows will fall in the mountains, although temperatures will change little. Fresh to strong southeast winds prevail off the coast, with occasional heavy squalls.

Burns and Bend recorded minimum temperatures of 25 degrees

today to oust Baker as the coldest spot in the state.

Other low readings included Baker 27, Brookings 48, Eugene 35, Hood River 30, Lakeview 28, Medford 39, Newport 40, North Bend 45, Pendleton 51, Portland 40, Roseburg 38, Siskiyou Summit 27.

The Oregon Motor association reported snow conditions on highways crossing the Cascades at high elevations, on the Wapinitia cut-off, The Dalles-California highway between Bend and Klamath Falls, on the Blue mountains between Pendleton and La Grande, and on the Parkdale-Government camp section of the Hood River-Government camp road. Chains were advised for motorists.
