Earl Ward, letterman center and forward, is somewhat incapacitated from a recent attack of flu, but an encouraging sign to offset this blue note is the return to form of Jim Finlay, clever ball-handling letterman guard, who has been out most of the season because of an infected foot.

The Indians will open the conference season this coming Friday on the senior high court, when they meet the strongest quintet in Coos county and the outstanding threat of the locals' chances of walking off with the District No. 3 confan—in Coquille high school.

Roseburg was to have opened last Friday at North Bend but an epidemic of colds and flu postponed the contest.

The Vandals made a real threat in the second half when Ramey shot goals from far and near for Idaho to hold the Webfoots to 33-28 six minutes before the end of the game. The Webfoots at that point began to roll again and shot five field goals to lead at the whistle by 12 points.
