PRUNES

PORTLAND, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Export inquiries encouraged the prune industry today in the absence of actual orders. Domestic demand continued light. C. J. Hansen of the agricultural marketing service said both growers and packers were primarily interested in proposed purchases by the federal surplus commodities corporation. Portland exported 1,604,643 pounds, principally to England, last month. Domestic shipments amounted to 1,312,300 pounds. Total 1939 exports were 14,283,634 pounds compared with 7,405,119 in 1938. For the same period domestic movement was 11,821,929 pounds against 15,877,408.
