

Huge Waves Deal California Ruin

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Damage estimates approached the \$1,000,000 mark today from waves as high as 25 feet, stirred up by some mysterious submarine force, which battered southern California's coastline for nearly 100 miles.

Heaviest loss, estimated unofficially at nearly \$500,000, was reported from the Santa Barbara sector, where beach homes were pounded and in some cases destroyed, a pier collapsed and a \$150,000 oil derrick tumbled into the sea. A \$100,000 mansion was undermined and cracking.

The great combers climaxed a seven-weeks' ocean disturbance for which weather experts were unable to account.

At Manhattan beach, the waves splintered a 150-foot section of the municipal pier, with damage placed at \$10,000. At Redondo Beach, 150 feet of ocean front railing was smashed. Water rolled over a waterfront street in Venice and swept away sections of beach. A pier and oil company loading wharf at El Segundo were damaged. Boardwalks at various points suffered.

Weather bureau predictions of a new storm by tomorrow caused fears of further loss. A rain which started Sunday brought Los Angeles 2.39 inches of precipitation.

Aged Kellogg Slayer Tells Story of Fight

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ments made last night, District Attorney Long said, officers learned that the two men, neighbors and friends, had gone to Elktion and had purchased two jugs of fortified wine. Both were said to have been intoxicated upon their return to Kellogg, 40 miles west of Roseburg. They went to Taylor's cabin, located about a mile from Kingston's small service station and store, and Kingston apparently remained with Taylor.

Taylor Planned Suicide

Taylor's story was that he went to sleep and was awakened during the night by someone he mistook for a robber, Long reported. He insisted that a struggle ensued and that in the midst of the fight he seized the rifle and fired a shot at the supposed intruder. He then sank into a chair in an adjoining room and later lay in a drunken stupor on the floor until daylight.

When he discovered the body of his friend, he told officers, according to the district attorney's report, he again began drinking and decided he would commit suicide. He had prepared a suicide note before the tragedy was discovered by Fred Weatherly, who had gone to Taylor's home to ascertain why Kingston had not returned home. Weatherly summoned other Kellogg residents to guard Taylor and then notified the sheriff's office at Roseburg.

Struggle Not Indicated

Taylor's account of a struggle preceding the shooting was not substantiated by the results of the autopsy. Deputy Sheriff Thornton said, as the position of the body showed the bed, with hands clasped across the chest, together with the powder burns inside the skull, indicated that Kingston was killed as he sat on the bed and that the muzzle of the gun was held against his head.

Taylor was to be questioned again later today, the district attorney said.

Kingston, a long-time resident of Douglas county, had resided at Kellogg for the last seven years, having previously lived at Elktion, where he was engaged as a cream-

eryman and later as a storekeeper, in recent years he had operated a small store and service station, located on the Fred Weatherly ranch at Kellogg. Surviving is his widow.

Funeral services are to be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at the M. E. church in Elktion. Arrangements are in charge of Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

Canish Ships Not Sunk

The admiralty said two British ships, the 3,369-ton Ivan Koudrup and the 555-ton Feddy, attacked yesterday and previously reported sunk, had been found afloat and probably would be brought into port.

Some observers believed the sudden German attacks might be the prelude to an aerial "blitzkrieg" or lightning war, such as has been threatened by Berlin many times.

Along with this renewed activity it was expected young Britons of the ages of 20 to 22 years, inclusive, registered in December, would be called to arms shortly, bringing an addition 240,000 men under the colors.

Mine Severs Vessel

Yesterday's attacks on British coastal waters came while Chamberlain was describing the recent quiet in the war with Germany as "the calm before the storm."

The 10,092-ton Dunbar Castle was broken in half by a mine off the English southeast coast, and British warships were reported hunting a German submarine base in the Canary Islands.

Capt. H. A. Causton and two of the Dunbar Castle's crew were killed; two others were reported missing. Huddled in blankets, the 48 passengers and remainder of the crew of 150 were brought to London today by rescuers. Nine children and several women were among them.

The Dunbar Castle, which just had begun a voyage for South Africa, was the largest liner mined in coastal waters since the 11,930-ton Japanese ship Tanikuni Maru was sunk Nov. 21.

Many of the survivors were injured, but the total was not ascertained. The rush of water into the hole in the side made launching of boats difficult, and the ship broke in half within 20 minutes, just as the last boat got away.

Two German bombers which attacked shipping off the east coast yesterday dropped its bombs at the 11,400-ton British steamer Northwood without scoring a single hit, the British said.

last September.

In the senate, Senator Adams (D., Colo.) asserted President Roosevelt had "outsmarted" congress when he made up his reduced budget, submitted last week, by trimming items "which are very dear to the heart" of congressmen. If congress uses these items, he told his fellows, then the president is in position to say that "we are the ones responsible for going over the debt limit or increasing taxes."

The senate approved a proposal to create a congressional budget-making committee. The joint committee of 24 members would study President Roosevelt's budget and tax estimates and then make recommendations of its own.

At the white house, members of the house democratic steering committee called on President Roosevelt and were told congress should stay within his budget.

Murphy Faces Protest.

Chairman Burke (D., Neb.), of a senate subcommittee studying the nomination of Attorney General Frank Murphy to the supreme court said a "number" of protests had been received and would be considered by the committee tomorrow. Other committees approved the nominations of James H. R. Cromwell to be minister to Canada and Charles Edison to be secretary of the navy.

Odds Favor Trade Pact.

A survey of the house ways and means committee indicated today a close vote on the bill extending the reciprocity trade program, with the odds favoring a recommendation of approval.

The committee, headed by Chairman Doughton (D., N. C.), will open hearings on the trade agreements act tomorrow.

An informal poll of the 15 democratic and 10 republican members showed that the "sure" vote is now 101 democrats for the bill and the 110 republicans against it. The other five democrats are still undecided.

Representative Disney (D., Okla.) one of the five, said he "generally" favored the trade agreements program under the state department, but was opposed to any program in which excise taxes are treated as tariffs.

Ex-Phone Girl Awarded Slice of Dodge Estate

DETROIT, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Under a probate court decision today Annie Laurie Dodge, former Canadian telephone operator, will receive \$1,250,000 from the estate of her husband, Daniel D. Dodge, who was fatally injured in 1933.

The estate is estimated to total nearly \$1,000,000.

The decision in effect gives \$1,250,000 to the widow, \$3,500,000 to Dodge's mother, Mrs. Mathilda R. Wilson, and \$6,000,000 to state and federal governments in inheritance tax.

Dodge's sisters, Mrs. Isabel Sheane, Mrs. Winifred Seyburn and Mrs. Frances Johnson, are ruled out under the decision.

Fisherman Saves Navy Fliers in Plane Mishap

BREMERTON, Wash., Jan. 10.—(AP)—Two occupants of a navy seaplane were rescued by a fisherman today after the craft was damaged in alighting on Sinclair inlet, a mile west of Puget Sound navy yard.

The plane was reported to be from the U.S.S. Saratoga. Names of the occupants were not learned immediately.

Finns Deal Fresh Blow To Invading Russians

rounded a third enemy division at Kukkamo, south of the scenes of recent triumphs.

For the first time since the red army invasion began the Finns have cleared the area between Lake Kianta, Suomussalmi and the frontier of Russian units and today they established border posts along a 30-mile stretch.

Details of the Kukkamo action were lacking, but ski troops finished mopping up remnants of the Russian 44th and 163rd divisions, routed in 14 days of bitter fighting.

Finland control was complete in the border region directly east of Lake Kianta, into which two Russian divisions marched at the start of the war.

Finns' Biggest Victory

Equipment and personal belongings abandoned by the fleeing Russians indicated the 44th division was one of the red army's crack units from the Polish campaign.

Defeat of the 44th along a four and one-half mile stretch of twisting highways was the biggest Finnish victory of the war.

Finland losses were small in the three days of fighting, a Finnish colonel in the Raate sector said, compared with the thousands of Russians killed and more than 1,000 taken prisoners.

Official Finnish figures on the war booty seized from the 44th included over 100 field guns, 45 tanks, ten armored cars, 260 trucks, ten of which were equipped with four anti-aircraft guns, 20 tractors, 1,200 horses and 29 antitank guns.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(AP)—

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Herbert Hoover, national chairman of the Finnish relief fund, announced yesterday the transfer of another \$100,000 to Finland, bringing the total to \$500,000.

Hoover said the problem of providing adequate clothing and food for homeless civilians in Finland "is becoming very serious" with the severe weather in that country.
