## OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Portland displayed its friendliness to Finnish war refugees today by increasing its share of a national contribution campaign to \$4356.

## Fine for Assault Hits Glendale Man

Jim Conaster, 45, of Glendale, was fined \$40 in justice court today on a charge of assault and battery following conviction in a trial held before Judge H. W. Marsters.

A. G. Clarke, Glendale resident, testified that two men were having a fist fight in front of his home and that he endeavored to stop the battle. When spectators refused to interfere, he said he announced he would call an officer and started back to his house. A man whom he identified at Conaster stopped him and threw him to the ground, he told the court.

Conaster, pleading his own case, introduced witnesses who testified they were present at the fight and that it was not Conaster but some other man whom they were unable to identify who assaulted Clarke.

Judge Marsters, however, held the defendant to be guilty and imposed a fine which Conaster was given time to pay.
