his plea of guilty.

The plea to a charge of second degree murder made a sentence of life imprisonment mandatory upon the court.

said, American tariffs have been lowered only where they are "unduly burdensome" and where other countries have agreed to accord better treatment to United States exports in return for tariff adjustments.

Serious Injury Denied
 "No evidence of serious injury has been advanced in the assertions and allegations which have been put forward by the opponents and critics of the trade agreements program," he said.

In some cases, he asserted, claims of injury had been made before the agreements were concluded and their terms known; in others, protests had been made when the duty actually had not been reduced or when the commodity had been on the free list under the Hawley-Smoot act.

The background of his argument was the theme which he has reiterated in and out of congress for years—that tariff barriers choke world trade channels, create economic depression for surplus-producing agriculture and industry, and constitute a threat to lasting peace.

reports today mounted that Russian military failures had brought a sharp army shakeup.

Norwegian and Finnish quarters heard from numerous sources that more than 100 soviet officers had been called back from the Finnish front to face trial because of the red army's failure to make greater progress after six weeks of fighting Finland.

The Russian supply commissariat was said to be under special scrutiny. There was no confirmation of the reports of the shake-up, however.

Russian Attacks Repulsed

Finland reported Russian attacks, launched after soviet artillery preparation, had been repulsed on the eastern and extreme northern fronts. Otherwise, the Finns said, there were no developments in the northern war.

The official German news agency, DNB, described new western front fighting in which a French detachment succeeded in breaking through German positions near Saarbruecken. The French soon were driven back, the agency said, leaving dead, wounded and prisoners.

War Affects Sweden

On the western front better weather gave a spurt to aerial activity. The allies and Germany each announced that two of the other's planes had been downed.

Embattled Finland's neighbor, Sweden, set up a \$200,000,000 war budget while King Gustaf in parliament expressed the nation's sympathy for Finland.

Already severely affected by involvement of her best customer, Germany, in war and the Finnish-Russian conflict, Sweden will have a deficit for the first time in many years because of the military budget.

Japs Bitter Toward U. S.

The United States program for extensive naval construction in the face of troubled world conditions, with war current in Finland, China and on the western front, drew bitter criticism from Japan.

One Japanese newspaper, in a tone adopted by other papers and spokesmen, spoke of "the American menace" in discussing the \$1,300,000,000 naval building program now under consideration by congress.

Ignoring the fact that Japan's denunciation of the Washington naval treaty in 1936 opened the way for a building race, a Japanese naval spokesman asserted that the new program would spur Japan to a naval construction contest with the United States.

The United States has merely indicated in undiplomatic terms its glaring hostility toward Japan," said the newspaper Nishi Nichi.

The navy's request for \$4,000,000 to develop Guam harbor drew particular Japanese fire.

of robberies—was solicited to the last. On the door of the bathroom, he posted a note which said "do not open this door. Poison gas. Call the police."

Gardner's note, addressed to newspapermen that they "let me down as light as possible," because "I have always played ball with you all the way, and now you should pitch me a slow one and let me hit it."

The ex-convict, whose criminal career began with an \$80,000 mail robbery in San Diego in April, 1929, said he would have "checked out" then had he known what the future held "and saved my loved ones the disgrace and shame that they have had to endure these many years."

He added that every convict on Alcatraz island, where he served about five years, "would be better off if they would jump in the bay and start swimming for China."

Daughter Protected.

Gardner appended a request to newspapermen that they not bring the name of his married daughter into the story of his death "because her in-laws do not know she is my daughter."

His wife, who was separated from him for 15 years by his prison sentences, obtained an annulment of their marriage in 1936, and later married again, said "I regret this very much" when informed of Gardner's death at her present home in Napa.

Slippery Prisoner.

Gardner, who was sentenced to 25 years imprisonment at McNeil Island, Wash., for the San Diego robbery, escaped from the train en route there at Eugene, Ore. He was recaptured in Roseville, Calif., May 23, 1931, and in the interim he robbed a mail train of \$117,000 in securities.

He told the federal judge who sentenced him to McNeil for 50 years that he would escape again, and he did on route to the prison, this time near Castle Rock, Wash. Recaptured at Centralla, Wash., and finally placed on the Puget sound island, he bolted from it in a sensational break September 5, 1931, while one companion was slain by guards and another wounded.

In November, 1931, he tried to rob a mail car in Phoenix, Ariz., but Herman Interlied, the clerk, overpowered him.

Lumber Industry Vital To Glendale Existence

The truth of it is that a big operator does business on a very small margin; he furnishes a service that the people must have and that no one else could furnish better, and if he can't continue to operate at a margin of profit he will go out of business. When he goes out of business, his employees go out of business."

Personally, I think that is putting the nut right back into its nutshell. I couldn't have said it better myself.

"We have to spend money to make economies," said Mr. Ingman.

He called my attention to: Number one: "Look at our sprinkler system, which you see here distributed throughout our whole plant. (It is an extensive plant.) It cost us upwards of \$35,000. Prior to its installation, we paid over \$10,000 for insurance each three-year period. Now we pay a little over \$12,000, which leaves us a saving of between \$9,000 and \$10,000 per year."

"This would keep you and me, our families and our families' relatives and friends in groceries for quite a spell."

"Shorter working hours and higher prices for our labor force us to certain economies. For instance, we have established a 'lifting' device for the feeding of lumber to our planers, which saves us labor of many men, as formerly conducted. It cost us money, and it cost our employees employment; but it is necessary, if we are to remain in business."

I could go on longer, but it wouldn't do any good.

The Inchem company has about eight million feet of lumber stacked out. You see, it has an overhead—it has to keep its shelves up. The government taxes that, too. Still and yet, a man and mill owner can't be caught with his pants completely down.

Another device, which cost money and which, however, doesn't add any to the price asked for the finished product, is a laminar dip, through which the pine lumber is passed, to kill a fungus which later would stain it badly and deteriorate its quality. The dip is pictured herewith, with a plank plunging into it (I hope it shows).

There's some more money tied up in the big pile (cold deck) of logs shown in another picture. There are seven thousand logs in it, representing between four and five million feet of lumber. All the logs are fair-sized, and many of them are exceedingly large. The lumber manufactured from them, would build a good sized town.

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
