Parity Payments Demand Is Made

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(AP)

Officials of the American Farm Bureau Federation today told President Roosevelt they would demand a \$607,000,000 appropriation for "parity" payments on cotton, corn, wheat, tobacco and rice and \$200,000,000 for dairy and other products.

Edward A. O'Neal, federation president, and the organization's executive committee called at the white house to outline their demands, which run counter to President Roosevelt's budget recommendations to congress.

O'Neal said the money requested would provide for 100 per cent parity payments to farmers, based on prices computed as of last December 15.

The federation informed the president it was willing to have additional taxes imposed, if necessary, to finance the payments.

Mr. Roosevelt excluded estimates for appropriations for parity payments from the budget for the fiscal year starting next July 1. Congress appropriated \$225,000,000 for the current year. Under the parity idea, a farmer would be assured of enough income from his products to buy what he needs, on the pre-world war basis.

The president explained in his budget message that he was not suggesting that the policy of parity payments be abandoned and that it might be necessary to ask later for appropriations. But he said that a request for funds was being omitted partially because of a hope that next year's crops would be sold at least 75 per cent of parity.

On December 15, when the Farm Bureau compiled its figures, farm prices were close to 75 per cent of parity.

Beaten Candidate Fails In Uprising

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Jan. 12.

(AP)—Jose Ibarra, apparently defeated as a presidential candidate, led an uprising of army sergeants and 30 soldiers at the military aviation field this morning, but the insurrection was quickly suppressed. Ibarra was arrested, along with two aides.

Ibarra was one of three candidates for the presidency in elections held yesterday and the day before.

On the basis of early returns Ibarra, a former president, was running second to Carlos Arroyo del Rio.

Third was Jacinto Casmayo, conservative, who came from Los An-

geles, Calif., to make the race. Arroyo del Rio resigned as provisional president to be a candidate.

Ibarra, who won in Guayaquil and Quito, Ecuador's largest cities, charged the government headed by Andres Cordoba with fraud. Arroyo del Rio had won in the small towns and rural districts.
