Guerrilla warfare has prevailed in the Petsamo area thus far, with sniping engagements between isolated units.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Finnish marksmen were reported to have picked off groups of Soviet Russian troops in the air as they attempted to land by parachute from planes behind the Finnish lines on the Karelian Isthmus.

The Stockholm newspaper Tidningen said several groups of 50 men in parachutes were "virtually annihilated" as they floated to earth at dusk yesterday.

Neighbors Aid Finns

Meanwhile, Scandinavian relief organizations in Finland are appealing for "practical aid" as reported by the arrival in Finland of Finnish volunteers, described by the Copenhagen newspaper Nationaltidende as "the first company" of men from Denmark.

Four contingents of Swedish volunteers, including some who resigned commissions in the Swedish army, previously had reached Finland and some were reported already at the front.

Swelling this aid was a nationwide campaign in Sweden for farmers to contribute products to the Finns. Every farmer was asked to give one day's milk or 50 pounds of corn for every 25 acres and one egg for every hen.

PARIS, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Spain, Italy and southeastern European countries are shipping war materials to embattled Finland through France, an official spokesman said today.

"The material from these countries is considerably," he said, adding volunteers also are en route from them to join the Finnish forces.

Observers understood the Spaniards were sending the Finns German and Russian guns which opposed each other in Spain during the civil war.

Great quantities of foreign armaments were left in Spain after the victory of Generalissimo Franco over the republican forces.

The spokesman did not name the southeastern European countries he said were rallying to Finland's aid.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today he had asked congressional leaders of both parties to work out the problem of giving assistance to Finland.

The chief executive had disclosed Tuesday he was discussing the matter of aid to Finland with the state department.

Asked at his press conference today whether the conversations had resulted in any decisions, he replied in the negative.

He said he understood that at his suggestion congressional leaders were trying to get together to see what might be done.

But, asserting he had not the faintest idea of specific steps that might be taken, he turned aside questions about whether aid might be extended in the form of loans or the selling of the army's Garand rifles to the Finns at a nominal sum.

Subscriptions will be opened Monday in Canada for a \$200,000, 21 per cent demobilization war loan to help meet the cost of the war with Germany, it was reported here.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Women (what won't they think of next?) will do a lot of swimming this summer in the closest thing to a corset you ever saw.

The creation, called a "swim suit" but not in any respect resembling the conventional middy blouse and bloomers, was displayed "to the trade" on four blondes and two brunettes. One of the latter also wore a red hair-ribbon.

"No more need the fastidious lady wear a rubber girdle under her bathing suit," explained one of the hired help. "We've combined the worst into a thing of beauty."

What they've actually done is woven tough rubber into the cloth so that the suits will stretch in one direction and not in the other. Fifty keen eyed experts, seated at tables in a Fifth Avenue atelier, tried to look blasé while the models paraded among them on wooden clogs.

Form "Accentuated"

A sales manager asserted: "These suits are designed so that the feminine form is accentuated along the most flattering lines with the contour of the body gracefully feminine." He pointed out what he meant. He was right.

One of the observers, commenting on a sleek white suit, opined: "There is a little more to this than meets the eye—but not much." He seemed pleased.

The judge said he might resign after serving only a part of a new six-year term if elected.

New Taxes Sought

President Roosevelt looks with favor on a 10 per cent "super-tax" on the income tax to pay emergency national defense costs, administration officials said, but he wants congressional leaders to take the initiative in framing proposals.

The "super-tax," although still an informal idea, might be applied retroactively to 1939 income as well as to 1940 income. A taxpayer would compute his levy in the usual way and then add 10 per cent to the total.

Officials said that the president virtually eliminated all but income tax sources for new revenues when he specified the new taxes ought to be "according to ability to pay and avoid taxes which decrease consumer purchasing power."

Falls Sixty Feet Onto Auto; No Bones Broken

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Henry Grabowski made quite a dent when he fell 60 feet from a fifth story window and landed on the metal top of an automobile but that's about the extent of the damage.

X-rays failed to find a single broken bone in the 26-year-old window cleaner but he was kept at a hospital overnight just to play safe.

Grabowski said a window sash gave away.

Larceny of School Funds Charged to Former Clerk

OREGON CITY, Jan. 12.—(AP)—The Clackamas county grand jury indicted Hugh L. Guthrie, Jr., former Sandy union high school clerk, yesterday on a charge of larceny of public funds.

The indictment accused Guthrie of converting \$397 of union high school funds to his own use last August.

Nazi Warplanes Continue To Harass British Coast

The air ministry later announced the raider had been driven off by British fighters and anti-aircraft guns.

A plane described as a Heinkel bomber flew high over the Suffolk coast and disappeared in a southeasterly direction when defense batteries opened fire.

Another Heinkel fled seaward from the Yorkshire coast when British planes swooped toward it. Off the east coast a big Dornier "flying pencil," which was believed to be a minelayer, was observed flying low over the sea. The craft was driven off by three British fighters.

PARIS, Jan. 12.—(AP)—French reports asserted three German planes had been brought down on the western front in the past two days in a series of air encounters which continued today in the coldest weather of the winter.
