Coquille Quintet Beats R. H. S., 29-22

Spurt in Last Three Minutes, Paced by Shambo, With 7 Points, Decides Battle.

A fourth-quarter rally engineered by a sharpshooting, tricky little guard, Shambo, who scored seven much-needed points in less than three minutes before the game ended, gave a powerful Coquille high school quintet a 29-to-22 victory over Roseburg to spoil the Indians' debut in the district No. 8 hoop race last night at senior high. The winners led 12 to 11 at half-time.

Though the score reveals the outcome of an exceedingly torrid and rough contest, it in no way attests how close the game was for three and one-half periods. At no time did either team lead by more than three points, except for the aforementioned last few minutes, and the score was deadlocked six times—4, 7, 9, 11-11, 12-12 and 13-13. The Indians led eight different times during the bruising battle and the Red Devils were out in front on four occasions. Coquille led 6 to 5 at the end of the first period, but the Indians were ahead by three points, 17-14, at the start of the final canto.

Coach "Spike" Leslie's Red Devils were definitely "on" in last night's embroilings while just the reverse was true for Coach Jim Watts' luckless Indians. Coquille took 29 shots from the field and connected for 12 for a high percentage of 398. The Indians had a measly 226 from seven field goals out of 31 shots at the elusive hoop. During the first half the Leslie-men made five out of 19 to Roseburg's four out of 16.

Red Devils Top Scorers

High-scoring honors went to two clever Red Devil guards, Schaefer and Shambo, who tallied 12 and 11 points respectively for 23 of their teams 29 points. Virg Sanders, Roseburg's wiry and elusive tiny guard, was third with 10, amassed on two field goals and six charity tosses.

The play was lightning-fast on both sides, each team employing the fast-breaking and all its variations to secure most of their few scores. The torrid-tempo resulted in a great deal of bodily contact and the officials were worked over time whistling down the violations. Twenty-eight fouls were called in all, 15 on the winners, 13 on Roseburg, plus three technical violations, two on the Red Devils, one on the Indians. Coquille lost two men on too many personals late in the fourth period and Roseburg, one; Goodman, Schaefer and Ward all being banished.

Except for the last few minutes, the game was anybody's, with the lead see-sawing back and forth throughout. Both teams endeavored to set up their plays which resulted in few shots at the hoop and the low score. Both quintets exhibited defenses as impenetrable almost as the Maginot and Siegfried lines, and though very few Indians or Red Devils escaped the alertness of the staunch guards, the winners were more fortunate in the few shots they did get.

Shambo Decides Battle

The last three minutes was a nightmare for the home-town rooters. About midway through the period, Schaefer, on another beautiful one-handed push shot from midcourt, gave Coquille a 22-21 lead, and from that point until on until the final whistle it was just too-much Shambo. The little guard connected a 20-footer to make it 24-21, then missed two free throws, but came back shortly after to break away for a set-up and a 26-21 score. Roseburg's last point came on a converted gift toss by Sanders on a technical foul. Shambo erased that point immediately with his third bucket, was fouled in the shot, and made good his free throw for the final point. The Indians tried desperately to score but could not connect.

While it was a bitter defeat to take before a large partisan crowd of rooters, the Indians showed enough to serve notice on Coos county quintets that the league title is anybody's prize. Shabby ball handling at times was the Indians' worst fault. The return to form of Jim Finlay, veteran guard, was one bright light even in defeat. Sanders played a beautiful game throughout. Puckett, Ward, Hughes and Baker all showed plenty of courage and fight. Schaefer and Shambo were by far outstanding for Coquille. Goodman and Smith did a fine job "out of the backboard."

Roseburg's next home game is Friday January 19, when a strong

Marshfield team, which recently nosed out Coquille in a non-conference game, will invade the Indian lair.
