

Fred Jones, Former Barber Here, Dies

Word was received here this morning of the sudden death early today at Petaluma, Calif., of Fred Jones, 40, former Roseburg resident. Death, it was stated, resulted from a heart attack. Mrs. Jones passed away less than a month ago.

Mrs. Jones was born at Roseburg and spent the greater part of his life here, being engaged in the barber trade. He had been residing at Petaluma for the last nine years.

Surviving are his father, Mark Jones, who is seriously ill, and three sisters, Mrs. D. N. Allison and Mrs. Margaret Cotton, both of Roseburg, and Mrs. Hallie Wallace of Astoria. Mrs. Wallace left for her home today after spending several days here with her father and sisters.

Funeral services are to be held at Petaluma, Wednesday.

Terrorist Roundup in Plot Against U. S. Nets 17 Men

They were charged specifically with "conspiring to overthrow, put down and destroy by force the government of the United States, and oppose by force the authority thereof; also to seize, take, and possess property of the United States."

The court room was filled with friends and relatives of the men. Several women wept as the prisoners were led away.

National Guard Faces Quiz
In Albany, Governor Herbert H. Lehman said he would order an immediate investigation of any connection between the Christian front and the personnel of the national guard.

Major Gen. William N. Haskell, commander of the New York national guard, said any guardman who stole rifles or ammunition from a state armory was subject to federal court-martial. The usual procedure, he added, is for each regiment to make its own investigation.

General Haskell said he had ordered Capt. John T. Prout, Jr., of the 165th Infantry, one of those arrested, be relieved of his command pending the result of the federal inquiry.

He telegraphed Hoover, extending the full cooperation of the national guard and said it was "unfortunate that a few irresponsible and reckless individuals can bring discredit upon our organization."

Penalty Increase Sought
Rep. Emanuel Celler (D-N. Y.) of Brooklyn, said he was one of the congressmen marked for assassination and declared that as ranking member of the house judiciary committee he would recommend legislation to increase the penalty for sedition.

"The penalty now seems to me to be inadequate in this case," Celler said. "The present penalty maximum is six years in prison and a \$5,000 fine."

The infinitesimal size of the group, Hoover said, in no way lessened the fanatical earnestness of its members. He added that the members in numbers and zeal resembled the early group that laid the groundwork for Hitler's rise to power.

Just how the men believed they could carry out the alleged plot in a city which has a police force of 18,000 and several nearby army posts was not explained.

FBI agents were searching in many localities for caches of arms such as the "small arsenal" they found in New York City in the course of a continuing six-month investigation of the alleged conspirators.

While the store of "revolutionary" arms here was comparatively small, Hoover indicated many more guns and bombs might be found elsewhere.

He said elaborate plans had been made for the theft of armament for revolutionary use from national guard arsenals. In fact, six of those under arrest were listed as members of the New York national guard, one as a member of the naval reserve and another as belonging to the marine reserve.

Aimed Also at Jews
One was described as a member of the German-American Bund, whose fuhrer, Fritz Kuhn, is in Sing Sing prison for stealing bond funds.

"The group depended," Hoover said, "upon terrorism and ultimate demoralization of communities to attain their objective. First of all they aimed at terrorization of Jews."

At the same time, according to their plans, they were to seize communications, transportation systems, customs and post offices.

He said the leaders of the alleged conspiracy were John F. Cassidy, Brooklyn head of the "Christian Front," and William Gerald Bishop, leader of a "Sports club," known as the "Country Gentlemen," secretly operating behind the front.

Cassidy, he said, was saluted Nazi-wise and addressed by the followers as "fuhrer."

Hoover disclosed that much of the evidence against the alleged conspiracy was obtained with long-range cameras operated by FBI agents from vantage points around the training camp of the organization at Narragansett, about 100 miles upstate in New York.

There, he said, the men were drilled in the use of arms and the making of bombs.

The "small arsenal" seized during the course of the investigation, ordered last August by Attorney General Frank Murphy, the new supreme court appointee, contained thousands of rounds of ammunition, 15 nearly-completed home-made rifles, 17 rifles and automatic pistols, a shotgun and a long sword.

Hoover declined to say whether the alleged plot had any connection with any "Christian front" organization itself, or with other organizations in this or other coun-

C. H. Neal, Native Of Oakland, Dies

Funeral services were held at the Christian church in Oakland at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon for Charles Howard Neal, 62, native of Douglas county, who died Friday at Portland. Mr. Neal suffered a paralytic stroke a week ago while on a business trip to Portland.

He was born in Oakland, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George B. Neal, early Douglas county settlers.

He was employed by the Southern Pacific company in 1913 and in 1916 was made roadmaster for the Roseburg-Eugene district. He later was made roadmaster for the Oakridge district. He was transferred in 1920 to Redding where he remained until his retirement three years ago.

Following his retirement he moved to Sutherlin, where he purchased the Fen Sutherlin ranch on which he had worked while quite young.

Surviving are his wife, Mabel Jones Neal, one daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Pearl Hannon, Redding, and six sons, Virgil Neal, Redding; Charles E. Neal, Weed, Calif.; and Delmer and Percy Neal, both of Redding. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Edna Longbrake, Oakland, and Mrs. Alice Percy, Cottage Grove, and four brothers, William C. Neal, who resides near Seattle, and brothers Fred and Ernest Neal, all of Portland.

The services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Tyndall and were closed with the Masonic ritual directed by Deputy Grand Master R. W. Marsters. Interment took place in the Masonic cemetery. Arrangements were in charge of Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at the Methodist church in Myrtle Creek for the Rev. N. D. Wood, 68, who died Sunday night at Medford, where he has been serving as pastor of the Southern Methodist church for the past five years. The Rev. Mr. Wood was pastor at Myrtle Creek for four years prior to moving to Medford, and supplied the Roseburg pulpit for several months last spring.

He was born in Texas and served in the ministry for more than 40 years. While engaged in pastorate in eastern Oregon for several years he was additionally employed as a government hunter and trapper with the U. S. biological survey.

Surviving are his wife and six sons and daughters, Earl Wood, Portland; Joe Wood, Longview, Wash.; Joyce Pageler, Portland; Mrs. Emily David, Medford, and Mrs. D. L. Hurst, Myrtle Creek. He was a member of the Masonic, Elks and Knights of Pythias lodges.

Italian Plane On Record Try Fails

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 15.—(AP)—The Italian embassy announced the Italian airplane seeking a new world's distance record landed on the Brazilian island of Fernando Noronha at 12:45 p. m. today about 3,000 miles short of her goal in Patagonia.

Under command of Col. Angelo Tondi, the Italian plane took off from Rome at 8:20 a. m. Sunday.

She had been in the air 34 hours and 25 minutes and had covered about 4,400 miles of her projected flight at the time given for the landing.

The mark fell far short of the world record of 7,162 miles established by two British royal air force planes Nov. 5-7, 1931, in a flight from Ismailia on the Suez canal to Darwin, Australia.

Tondi reported by radio earlier in the day that his fuel was escaping through a leak and he was proceeding on two motors trying to make Fernando Noronha.

RUSSIA ACCUSES NORWAY, SWEDEN OF AIDING FINNS

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Officials in Norway and Sweden today took a serious view of relations with Russia after a Soviet air raid on Sweden's Kalix island and Russia's publication of a diplomatic exchange with the two nations.

Russia accused Sweden and Norway of unneutrality by aiding Finland and declared Swedish and Norwegian replies to her protest were not entirely satisfactory.

The aerial attack, coupled with renewed red army blows at Finland and signs of strain between Moscow and the Scandinavian nations, indicated to observers here that Russia was ready for a new major effort against the Finns.

The Kremlin, these sources said, apparently was opening a campaign to cut off Scandinavian aid to Finland at the same time that the Russian army, balked in its first attempts at a "blitzkrieg," seemed to have completed preparations for a new offensive.

Soviet Raids Neutral
Reports in Stockholm said eight Russian planes bombed Kallaks, on the western side of the Gulf of Bothnia and about 60 miles from the nearest Finnish territory, yesterday. The small island is one of a group near Lulea, a mainland

port close to Swedish iron mines. Reports of a Russian aerial incursion into Norway also came from Kirkenes, Norway, across the border from Finland in the far north. These advices said Norwegian anti-aircraft batteries fired on 30 Russian planes crossing the ill-defined frontier after a flight southward from the direction of the Finnish Petsamo district.

Residents of Kallaks, it was said at Stockholm, reported one bomb struck land and eight others hit ice just offshore about noon.
