REV. MR. BARNEY TO OPEN TEACHERS TRAINING COURSE CLASSES

Rev. John Barney, minister of the local First Christian church, announces that he has started a Teachers Training Course for Sunday school teachers and others who may be interested. The meetings are non-sectarian and the purpose of the class is to give the general plan and development of the Bible with special emphasis upon the technique of imparting Bible knowledge to students. There will be no fees or offerings taken.

The classes will meet at the Christian church each Wednesday evening from 7:30 to 8:15 p. m. The classes are conducted in the same manner as a regular classroom lecture. The material presented is of value to people of all ages, and a most cordial invitation is extended to anyone who is interested in securing informative material on the Bible, either for personal use or for teaching purposes, to join this study group.

The following topics have been covered in previous sessions, and the material is available for the use of students who desire to enroll at this time: the meaning and origin of the name of the Bible; time covered; the old and new covenants; and the historical, structural, didactic, and prophetic unity of the Bible.

For this week, the subject to be covered is on the power and influence of the Bible, touching on its supernatural wisdom, its influence in transforming human life and in helping people to grow more Christ-like in character.

No textbook is necessary. However, students are requested to bring their Bible and a notebook for taking notes. Those who desire to do so may arrange with Mr. Barney to secure a Bible Handbook at a small charge which contains a great deal of concentrated data of particular value to teachers.
