

Oregon State Five Loses to Cougars

First of 2-Game Series Ends in 47-40 Score, to Create First-Place Tie in Race.

The Washington State Cougars topped the Oregon State Beavers from their undefeated perch in the northern division, Pacific Coast conference basketball drive, by winning the opening game of a two-game series in Pullman last night 47-40.

The victory put the Cougars in a first place tie with the Beavers. The contest was a battle of giants and was a nip and tuck throughout. The Cougars, led by Paul Lindeman, 6 feet, 7 inches, were paced point by point by the Beavers, who had six players who measured 6 feet, 4 inches.

Neither team held a substantial lead until the closing minutes. At the end of the first 15 minutes the Cougars led 15-14. At half-time they were ahead only 19-18. In the second period the Beavers moved into a 24-23 lead when Jack Jennings, veteran W.S.C. center, tipped a rebound back into the Oregon basket.

Olsen started the Cougars on their final half scoring drive when, with the Beavers leading 37-33, he caged a push shot and followed a free throw by his fellow guard, Butts with two more field goals, giving Washington State a six point lead that was never reduced. It was truly a battle royal with 40 personal fouls called, seven men being sent to the showers.

The Beavers after their finish this series tonight move to Moscow for a two game series with Idaho Friday and Saturday. The Oregon Webfoots, now in second place, meet the Washington Huskies in Seattle Friday and Saturday nights.

R. H. S. Hoopsters Dated for Battle

District - Leading Marshfield Pirates to Opponents on Local Court Friday.

Coach Jim Watts' Indian basketball team smarting from the 29-23 defeat at the hands of the Coquille Red Devils here last Friday evening are determined to atone for the loss by handling the league-leading Marshfield high school Pirates a stinging set-back in a District No. 8 battle scheduled for the local court Friday evening, Jan. 19.

By torpedoing the smooth-sailing Pirate ship, the Indians would throw the Coos-Douglas hoop race into a mad scramble for the top position. Marshfield holds the enviable spot as league-leader of the district by wins over North Bend and Myrtle Point as well as having defeated Coquille 24 to 22, in an overtime, non-conference game a week ago.

The Pirates boast a tall, rangy quietest, led by Davis, a clever, high-scoring forward who has been their main offensive threat in every game, and Cadarette, a tricky little ball-handler as well as a consistent scorer. Marshfield, at the present moment, is the surprise team of the conference from the early-season power displayed in turnings in their convincing victories. A win over this crew of experts by the local loopers would be just the "shot-in-the-arm" needed to make the Indians a definite threat to any Coos hopes for a title.

The battle for the five starting positions on the Redskin quintet is turning into a heated affair. Coach Watts has approximately eight men of almost equal ability, most of them capable of playing any position, and the task to pick the most "merciless five" is proving to be a task. No one has yet showed enough ability to oust the Virgil Sanders, Roseburg's high scoring guard, from one of the starting positions but the battle for the remaining four between Ray Packard, East Wier, Jim Finlay, Lowell Baker, Lowell Atterbury, Ed Hughes and Lilly Goodlow has been productive of some very good basketball.

Jury Finds Slayer of Son Innocent Because Insane

SEATTLE, Jan. 16.—(AP)—In one of the briefest first-degree murder trials in county history, a superior court jury yesterday found that Arthur N. Schiller, 41, an unemployed meat cutter accused of fatally stabbing his seven-year-old son was innocent by reason of insanity. The jury's verdict said Schiller "did commit the crime" but was mentally irresponsible at the time and also was mentally irrespon-

sible "at the time of trial." Judge Todd ordered Schiller committed to the insane ward at Walla Walla. It was brought out at the trial that two of Schiller's sisters on separate occasions several years ago killed themselves, one of them carrying her nine-year-old daughter to death with her.

The trial took less than three hours.

Gilmore Run Sets New Average High

Average mileage for all of the competing cars in the Gilmore-Yosemite run was boosted by one mile per gallon of gasoline over the 1939 record.

Average running time for all cars the fastest since the historic mileage test was begun in 1918. Every car to start the mileage classic finished well ahead of the allotted time.

These are just a few of the high points of the Gilmore-Yosemite run recently completed between Los Angeles and Yosemite National park—a run that saw 28 drivers cover themselves individually and collectively with glory for motor performance in the world's greatest stock car classic.

These mileage tests have always been gruelling events—and the 1940 edition was no exception. The first car got away from Gilmore stadium in Hollywood at 5:30 in the morning in the midst of a driving rain, and the elements continued to buffet the cars trying to achieve new mileage records for the entire 306.5 miles to Yosemite National park.

Flurries of snow and fast dropping temperatures were experienced by the drivers shortly after the cars left Coarse Gold and began the winding route up over the high Sierras. By the time the cars reached 6,000 feet high Chinquapien, "King Winter" was after the staid drivers with white vengeance—bordering the highway and covering the curves with a white, slippery carpet.

Because of the threatening weather, none of the drivers took any chances on coming close to the A.A.A. time limit of ten and a half hours for finishing the test. They all bore down on the throats heavily over the mountain grades so that every one of the 28 cars was checked in at Government Center with minutes to spare.

Official results released by the American Automobile Association contest board show that the average for the 28 cars was 23.9 miles per gallon of regular stock Red Lion gasoline. In 1939 the average was 21.9 miles per gallon.
