Coal Strike Hits Frigid N. Y. City

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(AP)—With the temperature far below freezing, coal deliveries in four boroughs of greater New York were partially paralyzed today as the vanguard of 5,000 coal handlers went on strike.

The walkout, threatening millions of office workers and apartment dwellers with a mid-winter snafu, followed the collapse of negotiations between the AFL, International Brotherhood of Teamsters and chauffeurs and the coal merchants and fuel merchants associations.

Truck drivers, yard men and helpers struck in Manhattan, the Bronx, Queens and Brooklyn.

Shortly before noon, the coal campaign accepted an offer by the state mediation board to attempt to bring both sides together for a discussion of the points in dispute.

Meanwhile, householders, with an eye on the family coal bin, saw the mercury drop to a low of 12 degrees, and the weather bureau forecast a minimum temperature of five degrees in city and suburbs tonight.

The strike resulted from the refusal of coal dealers to accede to the union's demands for a wage increase from \$1 to \$1.20 an hour with an extra man on each truck as a safety measure and to reduce unemployment.

Dealers contended if they met the union demands it would increase their labor costs 140 per cent.

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Fruit Growers to Meet in Roseburg

What the fruit grower may expect in view of present conditions will be one of the chief topics of discussion at the all-day horticultural meeting to be held in the I. O. O. F. hall in Roseburg Monday, January 22, according to an announcement by J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent, who has made arrangements for the meeting and the program.

Soil moisture and soil problems, the cause of die back, and the effects of thinning orchards, as well as a moving picture showing reasons why sprays do not always give results, the subjects which will be discussed, according to Mr. Parker, are of great importance to fruit and nut growers of Douglas county. Speakers will present the latest information and discoveries in fruit and nut production as well as soil investigations which have thrown new light upon many orchard problems.

The meeting will begin at 10 a. m., opening with the outlook for tree and nut fruits, followed by discussion of soil moisture and other soil problems. Following the lunch hour a moving picture on reasons why sprays do not always give results will be shown at 1:15. O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist, and R. E. Stephenson, soil specialist of Oregon State college, will be present.
