SCANDINAVIAN DEFENSE
BLOC PLAN MEETS FAVOR
STOCKHOLM, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Sweden's outstanding socialist leader, Fredrik Strom, today urged creation of a northern "defense league" as a movement gained ground for closer Scandinavian military collaboration in the face of the Russian-Finnish war.

Tremendous discussion of such collaboration was aroused in Sweden by former Foreign Minister Richard Sandler's speech in the riksdag (parliament) pleading for adoption of such a policy.

Special importance was attached to a statement published by Strom declaring "Finland would have escaped war if the northern countries earlier had established a northern defense league."

"Such a league would have been the surest guarantee for our peace and neutrality. Perhaps it is not yet too late to fashion such a league. Every day is costly now."

In speaking during the budget debate yesterday, Sandler drew applause with his criticism of Sweden's neutrality policy, saying that while "nobody wants war with the Soviet Union," there was no assurance a victorious Russian army would halt at the Swedish-Finnish border.

HELSINKI, Jan. 18.—(AP)—A Swedish police chief studying Finnish air raid precautions today said maps had been taken from captured Russian airmen showing detailed routes from a Soviet airfield southwest of Leningrad to points in Sweden and Norway.

"This looks like evidence they expect to do some bombing in Norway and Sweden," Police Chief Ernst Fontell of Gothenburg, Sweden, declared.

Fontell said he was in Turkey (Abo) during a recent air raid when the Finns forced down a Russian bomber carrying two officers and a pilot. He said both officers shot themselves to avoid capture but the pilot was taken prisoner.

Maps which the Russians carried, Fontell asserted, showed the routes to Sweden and Norway.

Blackout Toll Heavy
Blackout traffic fatalities, which have exceeded the war casualties of all Britain's fighting services, will be the subject of debate in the house of commons next Tuesday, Prime Minister Chamberlain announced today.

Chamberlain at the same time said any decision to extend the scope of present rationing would be communicated to commons at the earliest possible date.

Opportunity for debating the question probably will be given if desired, he said. Some opposition has been aroused in Britain by regulations rationing bacon, butter, ham and sugar supplies.

Ministry of transport figures published Monday showed that in the last four months of 1939 a total of 4,123 persons were killed in traffic accidents as compared with 2,494 during the similar period for 1938.

PARIS, Jan. 18.—(AP)—French and German artillery engaged in a heavy exchange for more than three hours yesterday in the region immediately west of the Saar river, French military sources reported today.

They said the Germans opened the bombardment and that the French batteries replied strongly until the German fire subsided.

Wilhelm Zaulberg, Van Zeijl, 26-year-old Dutchman, was executed by a firing squad today for espionage.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The 3,313-ton Greek steamer Asteria was sunk by a mine in the North sea last night. Eleven survivors of the crew of 24 were landed on Britain's east coast. They brought the body of one companion. The rest were believed to have drowned.

Prices of Cauliflower Upped by Cold Weather

Murphy, Jackson Sworn in New Federal Posts

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—(AP)—In the presence of President Roosevelt, officials high in the government and friends, Frank Murphy, new associate justice of the supreme court, took the oath of office today. At the same time Robert H. Jackson was sworn in as attorney general.

Judge Francis Biddle, who is leaving the third circuit court of appeals to take over Jackson's old duties as solicitor general, watched the ceremony. He was to have been sworn at the same time but decided to wait until next week because his family could not attend.

The president injected a touch of humor by having Murphy and Jackson sign a certificate swearing that they did not pay any money for their jobs or promise to pay any.

British Diplomat Asks U. S. Sympathy in War

PARIS, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Sir Ronald Hugh Campbell, British ambassador to Paris, today urged Americans to "bless our cause with your sympathy."

Addressing the American Luncheon club of Paris, Sir Ronald declared:

"While we have not the right to seek to influence your actions, we do ask you to believe, as we believe, that this war is no more and no less than a struggle between right and wrong."

Asserted Sir Ronald, this is "not a phoney war."

Pillsbury, Former Head of Telephone Co., Dies

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Horace Davis Pillsbury, 66, retired chairman of the board of directors of Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, prominent San Francisco attorney and director of several corporations, died today at Stanford University hospital here after a serious operation.

Born in Stockton, Calif., Pillsbury was associated with the telephone company 40 years. He became president in 1925 and chairman of the board in 1937, resigning in October, 1938, but continuing as a director.
