There will be a special meeting of the South Umpqua grange held at the school house the evening of Saturday, January 20. All grange members are urged to be present.

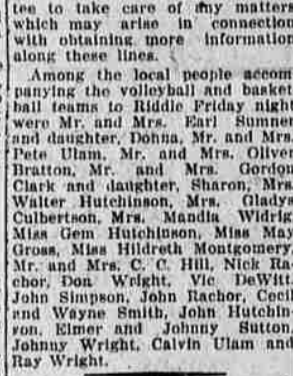

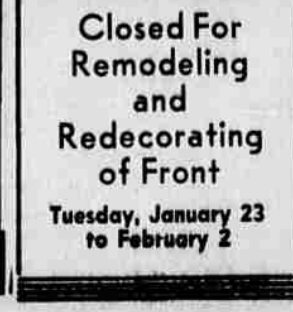

"Incompetent, unoriginal stenographer needed. Cannot be secretary because she never passed ugly duckling stage."

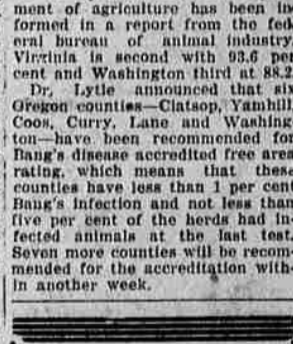
In two hours, she said, she got six bona fide offers.

Oregon Tops Nation in Bang's Disease Testing

Oregon leads the entire nation in the percentage of herds under test for Bang's disease, with the figure for this state 94.4 per cent. W. H. Lytle of the state department of agriculture has been informed in a report from the federal bureau of animal industry.

Viruses in second with 93.6 per cent and Washington third at 88.2. Dr. Lytle announced that six Oregon counties—Clatsop, Yamhill, Coos, Curry, Lane and Washington—have been recommended for Bang's disease accredited free area rating, which means that these counties have less than 1 per cent Bang's infection and not less than five per cent of the herds had infected animals at the last test. Seven more counties will be recommended for the accreditation within another week.
