Kidnap Victim of 1933 KMs Herself

Mary McElroy, Daughter Of Ousted Kansas City Head, Ends 7 Years' Brooding.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Crushed by the death of her father and brooding over the punishment of the men who kidnaped her, Miss Mary McElroy, daughter of Kansas City's ousted city manager, shot herself in the head at the family home Sunday.

H. F. McElroy, stormy autocrat of the city hall, had been both father and mother to his daughter and son. Their mother died when they were babies, and McElroy brought them up, dressed them, bathed them, supervised their education. Mary and "the old boy," as she called her father, had been inseparable companions for years. Mary McElroy, 22, had seen the will to live ebbling from him after former Mayor Bryce B. Smith moved him and other Pendergast organization men out of office last spring. McElroy died in the summer.

Seven years ago, during the kidnapers' trial, a defense attorney asked McElroy: "But your daughter was not harmed?"

"Yes," McElroy answered, "my daughter has been injured to the extent that I fear she never will get over it."

Yesterday morning Miss McElroy's maid found her body on a divan, a pistol on the floor. She left a note, unaddressed: "My four kidnapers are probably the only people on earth who don't consider me an utter fool."

"You have your death penalty now—no—please—give them a chance."

Shows Interest in Captors. For several years she had taken an "interest in the well-being" of her kidnapers, two of whom are in state prison, another has served his time and a fourth never was captured.

Her death was the tragic end of seven harrowing years, beginning with her kidnaping in 1933. Then followed the trial of three of her four abductors; her successful appeal to the governor to commute the death sentence on one of them; the ousting of her father as city manager in the breakdown of the Pendergast machine last spring and finally her father's death last summer.

Miss McElroy was kidnaped from her bath May 27, 1933, chained to the basement wall of a farm house near Shawnee, Kan., and released after being held prisoner 29 hours. Her father paid \$30,000 ransom.

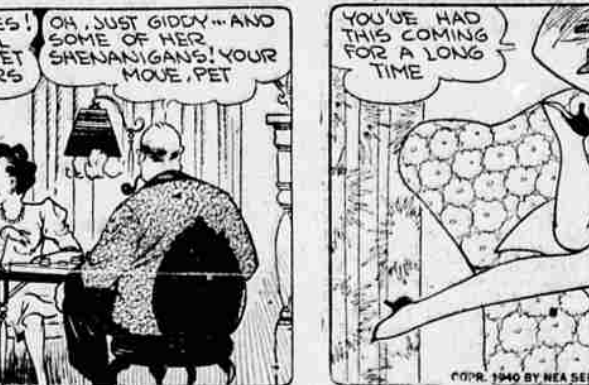

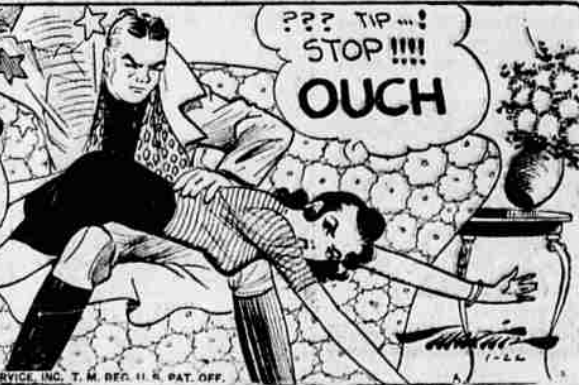
