posed such changes, suggesting the Dies committee move behind closed doors to go over prospective testimony and evidence, that no member make a public statement about evidence unless it had been approved by the full committee and efforts be made to give persons accused a chance "as soon as possible" to reply.

No Action on Finn Aid

At the white house, the usual Monday conference touched on cuts in appropriations, aid for Finland and relief. President Roosevelt, Vice President Garner, Speaker Hankford, Senate Majority Leader Barkley and House Democratic Leader Rayburn attended.

"No definite agreements were made," Barkley said. "Nothing was agreed to as to the form of any bill for aid to Finland. Secretary Hull is coming up before a senate committee Wednesday and nothing could be done before that."

The resolution the committee approved carries no authorization for appropriations. The house accounts committee will consider that question if the investigation is continued.

Budget Cut Supported

Powerful bipartisan support developed behind a senate appropriations committee proposal to chop nearly \$13,000,000 from the house bill for emergency defense and neutrality expenses.

The measure was whittled in the house \$20,176,985 below budget bureau recommendations. As approved by the senate committee, it would appropriate \$251,822,588.

Barkley, predicting senate adoption of the reduced figure, said the chamber would take up the legislation tomorrow. Both senate and house were in recess today for the state funeral of Senator Borah.

Barkley's forecast of a senate cut in the special appropriation bill brought a comment from Senator McNary of Oregon, the republican leader, that republicans generally would support the committee reductions.

Senator Byrnes (D. S. C.), a member of the appropriations committee, said a substantial portion of the proposed reduction was in funds for navy patrol planes. He added that the navy's chief need at present is additional training ships.

to his attacks by loudspeakers mounted in his positions which exhorted our men to surrender, declaring that Vilpuri would be taken within 48 hours and threatening that Germans were coming to help him and would kill all Finns.

In slight air activity yesterday, it was announced, only four persons were known to have been wounded.

Freezing of the Gulf of Finland from the Estonian to the Finnish shore has confronted Finland with the possibility of an over-ice attack from soviet bases in Estonia.

Foreign military observers speculated on the chances of success for such a thrust, but Finns insisted they were well prepared to meet it.

The coast, in some sections at least, has been fortified and barricaded with barbed wire. The Finns both at Hanko, for example, is laced with barbed wire.

Hanko, southernmost Finland, lies at the tip of a Gulf of Finland peninsula, 55 miles northwest of Baltisk, soviet Russia's Estonian air base.

Soviet Bases Raided

Successful Finnish air raids "on certain enemy air bases" were reported by a Finnish communique. Other sources said the raids were on the great soviet naval base at Kronstadt and on Baltisk, Estonian port where Russia recently established an air base.

Finland's aid thrusts into enemy territory were in retaliation for week-end soviet raids which inflicted widespread damage to more than a dozen Finnish towns and villages. Only three persons were reported killed, however.

The Finns said capture of Russian aviators had disclosed that Estonian bases were being used for at least part of the aerial attacks on Finland.

PORTLAND FINNS OPPOSE LOANS TO OWN COUNTRY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—A meeting of the Finnish Workers' Federation attended by nearly 200 passed a resolution here last night opposing war loans to Finland or any other country.

William Heikkila, northwest district organizer for the federation, declared that Finland was being used as Belgium was used in the world war—"to arouse sympathy and bring America into the war."

He declared Finland was being made the spearhead of an attack for a new world war.

The federation also passed a resolution condemning the Grays harbor authorities for their action in the Laura Law murder case.

striations, Japan protested formally to Britain against halting of the Japanese liner Asama Maru and seizure of 21 Germans who were passengers on their way home by way of Japan and Siberia.

The Asama Maru, bound for Yokohama from San Francisco, was halted yesterday by a shot across her bow. A British boarding party removed the Germans who formerly served on Standard Oil company ships in Central and South America.

The Japanese protest declared "forcible measures" were used to remove the Germans when the

Asama Maru's captain declined to surrender them.

Demanding that Britain "promptly furnish a full, valid explanation," Japan reserved the right to demand return of the German seamen and warned that any repetition would "aggravate all the more sentiment of the Japanese nation against Britain."

Golf Club Blow Costs Eugene Youth One Eye

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Ralph Schrader, Eugene youth, lost his left eye in a golfing accident at the Oakway course here Sunday. The former Oregon State college student was teaching "Jimmie" Groome, local girl, the proper way to swing her club when the girl's club struck Schrader in the left eye. The young man is in a local hospital today, but his condition is not believed to be critical.

Alleged Slayer Boils Body of Mother-in-Law

DUCHAREST, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Gendarmes heard John Hulka was having trouble with his mother-in-law. They broke into his house at Colman today and found her body boiling in a large kettle. Hulka was arrested on a murder charge.

Prince Christopher of Greece Passes at 51

ATHENS, Greece, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Prince Christopher, 51, uncle of the Duchess of Kent of England and one-time husband of the late Mrs. William B. Leeds, widow of the American "tin plate

king," died last night.

The youngest brother of the late King Constantine of Greece, he married Mrs. Leeds in 1920. He inherited a large part of her fortune. He married Princess Françoise de Calise of France in 1929.

Youth Causes Arrest of Man Who "Gypped" Him

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Charles Powers, 33, was charged with vagrancy today on the complaint of Roy Mishler, 18, Colvins youth who said he came to Portland to sell some rabbits and was talked out of his money on the promise of a job in the forest service.

The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral home. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

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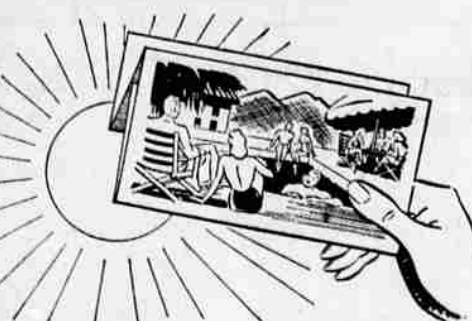
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
