MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE NOW ON

Much interest is being shown by Roseburg residents regarding the March of Dimes drive now on to raise funds for the fight against infantile paralysis, according to an announcement made today by Mrs. Claude Baker, county director of women's activities in the drive.

A number of residents have asked for envelopes to send in their dollar of dimes and Mrs. Baker has reported that the envelopes were not sent in time to this county and people desiring to send the money to headquarters are asked to send it in any secure way they can.

The committee is stressing the point that the fight against infantile paralysis drive is entirely divorced from politics, as it is an effort on the part of sympathetic people to help stamp out a terrible disease that may strike any family at any time.

This week there will be a display of a few braces from various people who have worn such. The display will be in the window of Fisher's department store. There will be placed in various stores about town, bottles in which youngsters and grown-ups may place pennies or dimes as they see fit. During this week in many localities all over the county, there will be a succession of teas and parties to swell the March of Dimes fund.

Areas which they are urging and which they are confident will be in large part adopted by congress.

With widows and children of deceased veterans of all other wars receiving the protection of the government, the Legion and auxiliary are seeking the same protection for those of deceased world war veterans in the name of justice.

At present only widows and children of world war veterans who have service-connected disabilities receive any help from the government after the veteran dies.

Veterans preference in government employment is a long established principle but is not working out satisfactorily, according to Legion leaders. Veterans get the "preference" they say, but someone else gets the jobs. Legislation will be sought to make appointment of qualified veterans to government positions more certain in the future.

As long as millions of Americans are without employment, no more immigrants should be admitted to the country, the Legion and auxiliary argue, and will urge legislation to close America's gates to foreign immigrants until the country has more jobs to offer. Stricter naturalization and deportation laws will be asked to help combat radical activities of alien agitators.

Commander Allen, in speaking before the combined groups at the banquet, congratulated the auxiliary on its selection of Mrs. Horsfall as its president, stating that her high personal standards gave weight to the worthy ideals and objectives of the organization. He spoke on the five point program of the Legion.

Five important points head the legislative program which the half million auxiliary women and one million American Legion members are supporting during the present session of congress, said Mrs. Tom Parkinson, legislative chairman of Umpqua unit, in commenting on Commander Allen's message. Universal service, adequate appropriations for national defense, federal protection for widows and children of deceased world war veterans, real preference for veterans in government employment, and tightening and deportation laws.

Enactment of the principle of universal service into law has been urged by the Legion and auxiliary ever since the world war to provide equal service for all and special profit for none in event of war. Universal service bills have been before congress at many sessions, with steadily increasing support. Leaders are hopeful that an effective universal service law can be enacted during this session.

National defenses strong enough to discourage aggression against the United States and to give full protection to the country in event of war always have been advocated by the Legion and auxiliary. This year they have a large and specific program of national defense mea-
