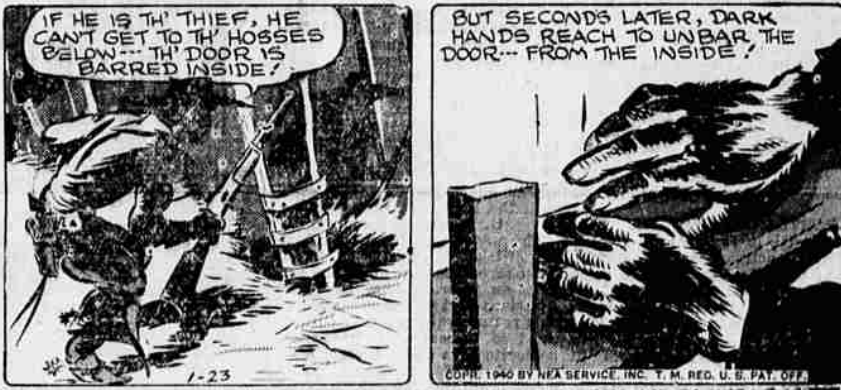

Talks Deal With Fruit Problems Horticultural Experts Heard by Douglas Orchardists at Meeting Held in Roseburg. The maintenance of organic matter in orchard soils is essential in keeping the trees in a strong, vigorous condition, stated Dr. R. E. Stephenson, speaking to orchardists attending the horticultural meeting held in Roseburg yesterday. Organic matter, he explained, not only supplied plant food but enabled the soil to retain greater quantities of moisture. Cover crops plowed under while still green and succulent rotted quickly and made available to the trees the plant food which they contained. The more mature cover crops are here being plowed under the more slowly they decay and the longer it takes for the plant food contained to become available. Thinning Aids Orchard. O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist, emphasized the necessity for a thorough job of spraying to secure satisfactory results for the control of diseases and insect pests. Failure to secure results more often came from poor spraying rather than the quality of sprays used. Eugene H. Fisher, of Oakland, and R. A. Busenbark, of Roseburg, stated that they had found it profitable to remove every other tree in their prime orchards. Thinning their orchards in this manner not only resulted in better sized fruit and improved quality but did not materially reduce the tonnage of fruit harvested. Prune growers were urged wherever they back appeared in the prime orchards to try removing every other tree to give the remaining trees more light and a greater surface from which to draw moisture and plant food. The improved quality of dried prunes was stressed and was pointed out by several growers that the intelligent sprayer in keeping his orchard in good condition would profit in the long run and secure as great a return per acre as any other crop that might be produced upon the land. Social Security Family Benefits Now Available

Monthly benefits for surviving family relatives of a worker who died after the social security act which became effective with the new year—provide valuable family protection amounting in some instances to thousands of dollars, Carl D. Monroe, manager of the Eugene office of the social security board announced.

Monroe explained these benefits will be paid under the following conditions: (1) The worker must have died after midnight of December 31, 1939; (2) he must have been employed at jobs covered by the social security act in at least six calendar quarters within the past three years and earned at least \$50 in each of those calendar quarters and (3) the widow must have in her care a child or adopted child of the deceased worker that is less than 16 years of age or under 18 if attending school, or be over 65 years of age.

"These survivor benefits are generally less understood than the old-age insurance payments," Monroe said, "but in terms of family security we consider them a highly important extension of the social security act. Forms for accepting claims for these survivor payments are available in the Eugene office and, after being properly filled out, will be sent immediately to the social security board in Washington for approval."

Payments Illustrated

Illustrating these payments Monroe said that if a worker, say 20 or 35 years of age, who had been employed the past three years at an average wage of \$150 per month should be leaving a widow and two children of ages 5 and 7, the federal treasury would pay a monthly check of \$23.18 to the widow and \$15.45 to each child.

He pointed out that the total to this family group would be \$54.08. If the average monthly wage had been \$100, instead of \$150, the widow and two children would have received \$15.00 in monthly benefits.

The widow's benefits continue until the youngest child is 16 or 18 if it continues in school. If, however, she remarries previous to that time, her benefits would be terminated, but payments to the children would continue to age 18 if enrolled at school.

The maximum benefit to a family group is reached when there is a surviving widow with three children. At the top of the scale a widow and three children of a deceased worker who has averaged \$250 per month at jobs covered by the social security act during the past three years would re-

Jimmy Britt, Old Time Boxer, Dies

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 23.—(AP)—The death of Jimmy Britt, the colorful, little Irishman who fought the best lightweight of his day at the turn of the century, wrote this today to another chapter in San Francisco's robust past.

Britt was found dead in his home yesterday. Deputy Coroner Michael Brown said death had come a day or two before, evidently from a heart attack. He was 60.

Son of a former city supervisor, Britt emerged from the "South Market" district to fight the toughest that came his way—and whip most of them.

He turned professional in 1902, and fought such lightweight greats as Joe Gans, Kid Lavigne, Battling Nelson, Frank Erne, Ad Wolgast, Terry McGovern Young Corbett II, Paddy MacFarland. He won 17 fights and lost three.

Twice he fought Gans for the world championship but lost both bouts. He proclaimed himself the "white champion" in 1902 after knocking out Lavigne, former titlist, in the eighth round.

After retiring from the ring in 1909, Britt became an international stage favorite, and toured the United States several times in vaudeville.
