

Diamond Lake's Sport Nears End

The change in weather conditions, expected to bring snow in the high Cascades, will probably end an unusual condition which has brought much pleasure to ice skaters at Diamond Lake. It was reported today at the local headquarters of the Empire National Forest. For the past week the lake has been visited by a large number of winter sports enthusiasts, who have enjoyed exceptionally fine skating on a smooth surface of 10-inch ice.

The lake is completely frozen over. It was stated, and a large area, free of snow, has been available in the center of the lake. A great many skaters from the Klamath Falls area have been visiting the lake. Roads have been open on all routes and only about 12 inches of snow now blankets the north end of the lake where the resort facilities are located. It is expected, however, that the current storm will bring comparatively heavy snows in the higher elevations.

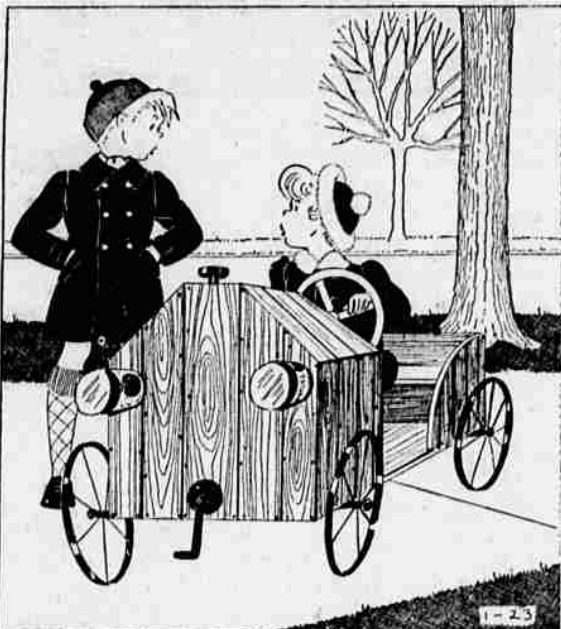

the public debt the next fiscal year would be \$1,100,000,000, about \$50,000,000 more than in the current year.

For the third time he recommended congress inquire into bank holding companies—situations "where a bank holding company can go in and buy up a bank and take control away from the community."

Morgenthau and his aides told the committee the treasury's financing program had been well received. They said insured banks now hold \$15,038,000,000 of federal obligations.

U. S., Britain Wrangle Over Delay of Vessels

ment officials at Washington made this triple comment today:

1. American shippers are co-operating to an amazing extent to avoid unpleasant incidents.

2. They are not obliged to co-operate at all.

3. Possible lack of cooperation does not excuse the British for undue detention of American ships.

Officials listed cooperation by shippers as embracing application to British authorities for navicerts (navigation certificates) supplying copies of their manifests (lists of cargo) by airmail, and giving so-called black diamond guarantees, which are promises not to discharge suspected items of cargo until the British have approved.

U. S. Won't Assent.

The navicert certifies that a British official in the United States has okayed some or all of the cargo of an American ship leaving an American port on the grounds that it is not contraband and is not destined to Germany. Possession of navicerts by a ship's captain when stopped by a British or French warship entitles the ship to speedier handling.

The state department has refused to give its official recognition to the navicert system, which, in effect, is a form of British control exercised within the United States. It says, in effect, that an American shipper can do as he pleases with regard to them.

The maritime commission rules that American ships can not refuse to accept American cargo not covered by navicerts.

Japan protested Britain's seizure of 21 German seamen from the Japanese steamer Asama Maru 25 miles off the east coast of Japan.

Foreign Minister Arita declared Japan would insist on return of the Germans, a "right" Japan reserved yesterday in making a strong protest against the action of a British warship.

A British spokesman in London, however, said the Japanese protest did not question Britain's right to search the Asama Maru, but that Japan was concerned over the status of the German captives.

Police prevented members of a rightist political party from demonstrating before the British embassy at Tokyo. The German seamen, returning home from the United States by way of Japan,

were taken off the Asama Maru Saturday.

ivazi Troops Stir Rumania

New apprehension arose in southeastern Europe over reports German troops, with Russia's consent, were deployed along the Polish railway leading to the Rumanian frontier and Russia agreed to German technical supervision of railways in former Poland.

Germany denied the reports, but Bucharest authorities said they had been informed of German penetration into the Russian-occupied section of Poland and had been assured there would be no troop concentrations on the Rumanian frontier.

Some diplomats expressed fear German transportation control might be used as a lever for pressure on Rumania, whose wheat and oil supplies Germany desires.

Official sources said Russia consented to the policing after Germany complained that shipments of grain and oil to supply her war machine had been delayed and sometimes lost because of rebellious and inefficient crews.

Allies' Wells Involved

Britain and France today warned the Rumanian government that any attempt to compel British and French oil companies operating in Rumania to furnish oil for Germany might "lead to grave complications."

The warning followed a Rumanian decree creating a national petroleum commission with authority to control production, refining and export of all Rumanian oil "in conformity with the interests of the state."

The decree gave the commission sweeping powers, including the right to take over companies not submitting to its orders.

In some foreign circles the Rumanian decree was reported due to German pressure to obtain all the oil possible from Rumania.

The western war front was quiet except for a small engagement near the Vosges mountains. Germany and France each claimed success in the encounter involving a Nazi patrol.

secretary, gave reporters a statement which said the committee was "engaged with the duty of protecting the interests of the United States by preventing conflict with the requirements of this country and its citizens in the American markets."

At the capitol, meanwhile, Chairman Vinson (R., Ga.), of the house naval committee asked the navy department today to submit plans for a two-year instead of a three-year building program.

He thus raised the possibility of another drastic reduction in the new fleet expansion program, already reduced by \$500,000,000.
