## President's Ball Promises Gaiety

The annual President's Birthday ball to be held in Roseburg Tuesday, Jan. 30, promises to be a gala affair, according to A. B. Cacy, local chairman, who is in charge of arrangements for the coming event. Tickets have been placed in the hands of members of local service clubs and there is every indication of a large sale in Roseburg and vicinity, Mr. Cacy reports.

The dance will be one of many to be held throughout the nation as a part of the national campaign against infantile paralysis. One-half of the receipts will be retained locally, while the balance will go to the national infantile paralysis foundation, sponsored by President Roosevelt. For several years the local fund has been of great aid to Douglas county victims of the dread disease. There still exists a small balance from last year, and it is hoped that this year's proceeds will be sufficient to provide a substantial sum for local use, Mr. Cacy states.

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Mrs. Roberts reports, and the total will be somewhat larger than the amount already reported when the account finally is closed.

Based on returns so far received the sale has averaged six seats per capita, which will leave 65 per cent of the total proceeds to be left in Douglas county for use in the campaign to stamp out tuberculosis and assist county residents afflicted with the disease.

Mrs. Roberts states that she greatly appreciates the work of the 1939 local sale committee chairman and members and the splendid cooperation of residents of the county in making the sale so successful.

A new record for Douglas county in connection with the annual sale of anti-tuberculosis seats was set during the recent holiday season, Mrs. C. E. Roberts, county chairman, reported today. Returns to date from the sale of the Christmas seats total \$1,320, the largest amount ever raised by the campaign in Douglas county. Returns still are being received.

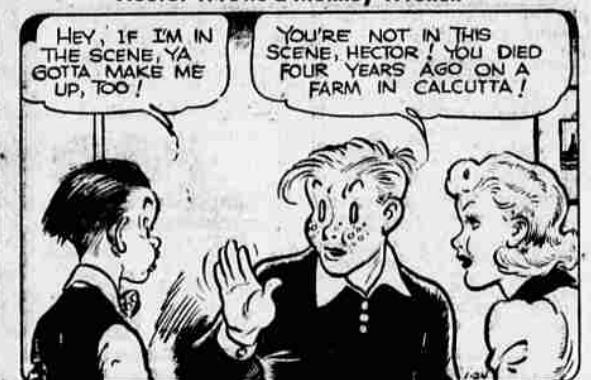
