## SENATE GROUP OPENS WAY FOR U. S. LOAN TO FINLAND

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The senate banking committee approved today an increase of \$100,000,000 in the capital of the export-import bank to permit a non-military loan to Finland.

In okaying a revised bill by Senator Brown (D. Mich.), the committee placed restrictions around future loans which would prevent the granting of more than \$20,000,000 in credits to any one nation.

The committee also amended the Brown bill to provide that the purchase of arms and munitions extended in violation of international law as interpreted by the state department.

The bank already has made \$10,000,000 available to Finland for the purchase of non-military supplies, and the Finns thus far have drawn only a part of the money.

## BRITISH LOSE ANOTHER DESTROYER, WITH ALL CREW

LONDON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Sinking of the British destroyer Exmouth by a torpedo or mine in the North sea with the loss of all hands—nearly 200 men—was reported by the admiralty today on the 25th anniversary of the world war battle of Jutland.

It was the fifth destroyer and 23rd British naval vessel acknowledged as sunk since the present war with Germany began Sept. 1.

The Exmouth normally carried 175 men, but wartime crews usually are increased about 10 per cent. A 1,475-ton vessel, built in 1934, the Exmouth was a flotilla leader, carrying five 4.7 inch guns, seven smaller guns, and eight 21-inch torpedo tubes.

The sinking was the first in which not a man was reported saved.

She was the same class as the Grenville, destroyer which sank Saturday with a loss of 81 lives.

The Exmouth's commander, Capt. R. S. Thomson, received the distinguished service order only last month for "successful action against enemy submarines."

## Nazi Bomber Routed

Three German planes appeared over the Shetland islands today and were reported to have dropped bombs before being chased off by British fighters.

The invaders flew into a cloud, evading their pursuers.

Six bombs were reported to have been dropped without inflicting damage.

## Trawler Given Up

The British trawler New Haven was reported lost today after being

a week overdue, and relatives of the crew of nine were advised of finally that hope "no longer can be sustained."

Nine sailors from the sunken Swedish steamer *Franca* clinging to a wave-swept raft in the North sea but only one lived to tell about it. Stig Borgstrom, 27, Swedish sailor, was picked up by the Norwegian steamer *Leka* after four days. Eight fellow crewmen, including his brother, perished before help arrived, Borgstrom said when he reached here today.

The *Franca* sank Jan. 18 after an explosion.

## Nazi Patrol Bailed

The French reported they had bailed a German patrol thrust on the western front near the Vosges mountains, only activity mentioned on the stalemate lines where Germany and the allies face one another.

From Honolulu came the report that another Japanese liner, *Tatuta Maru*, had been halted by a warship seeking German passengers. The ship's captain said the unidentified warship signalled the Japanese vessel to halt Jan. 18, was told she carried only five German civilians and then permitted the *Tatuta Maru* to proceed.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The 726-ton Belgian freighter *Meuse* with a crew of seven, was feared lost today. The *Meuse* has not been reported since she radioed Jan. 18 that she was en route to Zeebrugge.

## Local Freightways Agent Transferred, Promoted

A. C. Berreman, local agent for the Consolidated Freightways, was notified today of his transfer to Minneapolis, Minn., effective Feb. 1, and his promotion to a supervisory position. Mr. Berreman has been employed in Roseburg for the past two years, coming to this city from Spokane. He was selected for transfer and promotion, it was reported, because of efficient work in the Roseburg district. He plans to leave the first of the month with his wife and two sons, Tommy and Henry, to take up his new duties.

## Walter Leonard Johnson Of Camas Valley Dies

Walter Leonard Johnson, 37, a resident of Camas Valley, died at Mersey hospital Tuesday afternoon after a long illness. He was born July 26, 1902, in Marshall Co., Minn., and came to Douglas county 11 years ago. Surviving are his wife and three children. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel. Rev. G. A. Edwards officiating. Interment will follow in the L.O.O.F. cemetery.

can farm products was concerned, Peck recommended:

1.—That congress pass a bill like one introduced by Representative Woodruff (R. Mich.) to suspend the importation of any competitive farm product so long as the American domestic price on that commodity was below parity.

2.—That all trade agreements be subject to approval by one or both houses of congress. (Such approval is not now required, and Secretary Hull has opposed proposals that pact be passed upon in each case by the senate.)

3.—That congress consider the creation of an independent foreign trade authority, of cabinet status, to handle matters of foreign commercial and financial policy. (The state department, which now negotiates trade agreements, is of all government agencies "the least familiar with our domestic internal problems and the most susceptible to foreign pressure of representation," Peck said.)

4.—After stopping the "price-depressing influence of competitive imports," the government should adopt some method—"either the old processing tax or the new income certificate plan"—to give farmers better returns on export crops.

## Also a Preacher

Aside from being born in "Old Kaintuck," and not necessarily as a result thereof being in the contracting business for a long time, Mr. Taylor has been a preacher for eighteen years. He's the kind of preacher you'd like (of course, I reckon you might like 'em all)—sure and sensible, extremely intelligent, with a keen sense of humor.

"We like our home here, my wife and I," Mr. Taylor said. "We like Oregon, and we like Douglas county. I've been in every state of the Union, preaching and contracting and farming, and I know when I find a spot that suits me, I wish I had space to recite to

you some of the rich reminiscences with which Mr. Taylor lightened my short visit with him. I'd like to touch upon the full enjoyment, as well as sympathy, with which he views the exploits of his fellow man; and I'd like also to let you in on his not-to-reticent opinions concerning our present administration, and the jolly time it has, making monkeys of us all. But I can't now—but hope to, at some later date.

I might just add this, however, in passing: As a democrat from "Old Kentucky," Mr. Taylor would make a passably good republican in any man's language!

economy, relations with foreign nations or the issues of war or peace.

"Labor today has no point of contact with the democratic administration in power except for casual occasional interviews which are granted its individual leaders as they come to the congress, the unrestrained baiting and defaming of labor by the democratic majority has become a pastime, never subject to rebuke by the titular or actual leaders of the party."

Lewis asserted the democratic party "is in default to the American people" and labor and the people are losing confidence.
