QUINCY, Ill., Jan. 25.—(AP)—Ben Lacke, a bachelor farmer, has given up the movies after one trial.

Just 25 years ago Ben decided to see a movie. He hitched his horse to a buggy and started toward Quincy, five miles from his farm. A thunderstorm broke so he turned back.

On his 68th birthday anniversary this week he decided he'd give the movies a last chance. He walked five miles through deep snow drifts and stayed in the theater five minutes.

"Didn't like the show," he explained as he walked briskly over to No. 6 fire engine house to play a game of cards, his daily diversion for years.

Newlyweds Prove Brother and Sister

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Two love-struck young newlyweds went their separate ways today, told in court they evidently were brother and sister and so never before the law could be man and wife.

Leroy Williamson, 20, and Virginia Williamson, 18, married here Jan. 6, sat holding hands yesterday as Juvenile Judge Wilfred Bradshaw told them records showed they were "at least half-brother and half-sister" and the law could not recognize their union.

The judge said, though, he would not band down his final ruling until tomorrow.

"I don't want to close the case," he explained, "until the most diligent search has been made for any additional evidence."

Virginia, an expectant mother, sobbed often. Her husband, himself nervously turning him, himself tried to comfort her.

They are wards of the court.

Mrs. Crystal Clair Harker of Urbana, Ill., testified both were born here to her sister, Mrs. Helen Williamson, then unmarried.

The girl, under the name of Virginia Wolfe, was adopted by an Indianapolis family. The boy went with his mother to Michigan City, where she died in 1924. He returned here last April.

His aunt's testimony drove home to him the fact he had sought to disprove by studying conflicting birth records—that he and the girl he loved were blood kin.

He wept as he admitted this. Then, declining to make at once the break he knew must come sooner or later, he walked out of the courtroom to go to Urbana with his aunt. He will stay there till tomorrow's hearing.

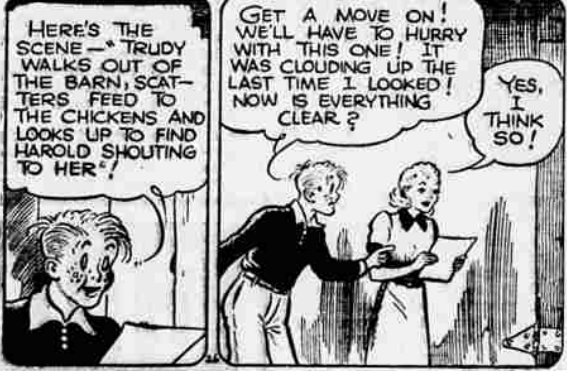

Fix Plywood Plant at Lebanon Is Projected

MARSHFIELD, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Projected construction of a \$1,000,000 fir plywood plant at Lebanon this year was announced today by Max D. Tucker for the Evans Products company of Detroit, Mich.

Tucker, manager of the firm's international cedar division here, said the company has options on a large tract of land at Lebanon.

"More than 11 billion feet of first growth fir remains uncut in Linn county, with a heavy percentage of peeler logs," Evans said. He added that northern Lane and southern Clackamas counties could be tapped for logs as well.

The Evans firm already has a large cedar battery separator plant at Marshfield.
