Oregon Has New Insurance Chief

SALEM, Jan. 26.—Governor Charles A. Sprague Thursday announced the appointment of Seth B. Thompson, Portland, as state insurance commissioner, to succeed Hugh H. Earle, who has resigned, effective March 1.

Thompson has been a resident of Portland for many years and is engaged in the insurance business there. He is a republican.

Earle, a democrat, was appointed state insurance commissioner early in the administration of ex-Governor Charles H. Martin. He served approximately a year under the Sprague administration. His term would have expired June 30, 1941.

The office carries a salary of \$5000 a year.
